### DR. J. G. SCHURMAN UNANIMOUSLY ELECTED

NEW YORK, Sept. 7—Governor Whitman's nominations for the Food Control Commission were sent to the Senate some time after that body reconvened at 5.30 o'clock this afternoon. They were:

GEORGE W. PERKINS of New York, designated as President of the commission.

JACOB GOULD SCHURMAN of Ithaca, President of Cornell University.

CHARLES A. WEITING, member of the State Fair Commission, and ex-State Commissioner of Agriculture.

Dr. Schurman and Mr. Weiting are Republicans. Mr. Perkins is still enrolled under the Bull Moose emblem. The nominations were at once referred to the Finance Committee, of which Henry M. Sage of Albany is Chairman. The committee met to consider the appointments when the Senate, after a brief session, took a recess until 8 o'clock this evening. The committee meeting was held behind closed doors and lasted an hour. It was then learned that by unanimous vote the committee had decided to report favorably the nomination of Dr. Schurman, that a favorable report on the nomination of Mr. Weiting had been adopted by a vote of 12 to 2, the adverse votes being cast by Senators George A. Slater of Westchester and George F. Thompson of Niagara, and that the nomination of Mr. Perkins had been rejected by a vote of 10 to 4.
