REDS RETREAT FROM ROSTOV; NAZIS PUSH ON
The Russians have announced their withdrawal from Rostov, at the portal of the Caucasus, and Berlin claims the Soviet's defense line is retreating all along the Lower Don from the Rostov area eastward to the great bend of the river 50 miles or less from Stalingrad and the Volga.

Lively Scenes In Hong Kong Debate
The same communique telling of the withdrawal from Rostov, which the Red army wrested back from the Germans last winter, reported abandonment of Novocheerkassk, 20 miles to the northeast of Rostov. Earlier, Moscow admitted that at least two bridgeheads on the south bank of the Don were in enemy hands east of the Donets inflow.

600 Bombers Raid Hamburg
LONDON, July 27—(AP)—At least 600 R.A.F. and R.C.A.F. bombers swarmed upon Hamburg in a powerful overnight assault. The German prize port and greatest submarine building centre, blitzed today from a shower of two-ton explosives and more than 175,000 incendiary bombs in another flaming answer to the U-boat challenge. Four R.C.A.F. squadrons participated.

Col. Ralston Defends Dept. Of Defence Act
OTTAWA, July 27—(CP)—Defence Minister Ralston told the House of Commons tonight that retirement from the service of Maj.-Gen. E. J. C. Schmidlin, Quartermaster-General of the Canadian Army, was partly due to the adverse criticism of the Quartermaster-General's department in the Duff Commission Report on dispatch of troops to Hong Kong.

War Situation Last Night

Bataisk Has Been Captured

MOSCOW, July 28—(Tuesday)—(AP)—An overwhelmed Red Army has withdrawn from Rostov on the Don and from Novocheerkassk, 20 miles to the north-east, before the steady German drive into the Caucasus, the Russians announced early today.

Night Ace Has 16 Nazis To Credit
LONDON, July 27—(CP)—"Catsy" Cunningham—acting Wing Comdr. John Cunningham, D.S.O., D.F.C.—is Britain's No. 1 night-fighter ace. Fifteen of his 16 Nazi victims have been shot down in the dark; and a bar to the D.S.O. in the latest list of R.A.F. heroes is his reward for a sensational "kill" which he made, without firing a single shot, by stalking his enemy across clouded skies with cold-blooded timing and calculation, diving from a cloud with tremendous speed and sending the Nazi crashing to the ground.

12 Axis Planes Downed At Malta
VALETTA, MALTA, July 27—(CP)—Twelve Axis planes, three Nazi bombers and eight fighters, and one Italian fighter, were destroyed by the R.A.F. in two attacks on this British Mediterranean island today, a communique announced.

Upswing In Potato Prices Is Predicted
OTTAWA, July 27—(CP)—An agriculture department official predicted tonight that Canada's potato markets will experience a "similar reaction" to that shown by the potato futures market on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange today, but added that the reaction is expected to be less extensive than in the United States.

Is Charged With Robbery
GRAND FALLS, N. B., July 27—(CP)—A charge of robbery with violence was laid today against a man named Dube, of Salmon River, while Louis Dube lay in hospital suffering effects of a severe beating. Beaulieu, arrested last night was unable to identify the robber.

Sheep Expansion Policy Announced
Details of Program Designed To Achieve 25 Percent Increase In Wool Production.

As a result of war conditions in the Pacific and elsewhere, the delivery of wool to Canada's greater production of wool on Canadian farms has been urged by the Wool Administrator of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board and leading fields throughout the Dominion who have made a study of the domestic situation.

400th Ship Torpedoed
The sinking of an obscure little oiler was reported by Capt. Walter Broward Crossland. He said a law-rattened U-boat hijacked his boat just off Havana, forced himself and two other crewmen out and then helped themselves to 40,000 pounds of onions, canned goods and a quantity of diesel oil. The three survivors heard an explosion later and presumed the craft was sunk.

Stellarton Coal Mines Tied Up
STELLARTON, N. S., July 27—(CP)—The Albion and MacGregor Collieries of the Acadia Coal Company were tied up today when their workers walked out in a dispute over the transfer of two miners.

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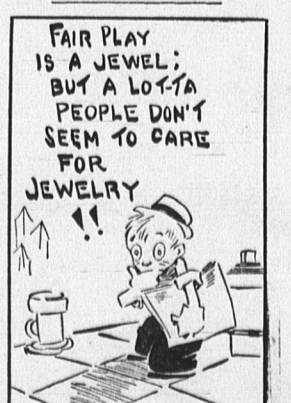
