Literature And Life

ECHOES

What is an echo? Mythology says that it is "a child of the air." Two things are involved in every echo—a voice of sound and a surface from which there is a reflection.

In our school books of long ago there was the story of the "stone that rebounded"; a man fifty years before had killed a bird just show how accurately he could aim. He had silenced forever a sweet singer, and after that long time he felt that he had done wrong—somehow had done harm to nature. The stone had rebounded. Then there was the story of the boy who complained to his mother that some one had hid in the quarry and called him bad names. His mother told him that it was his own voice coming back to him and that "kind words would bring kind echoes."

Records are now made of speeches and songs and they are reproduced, so that we have another illustration of the text, "ne being dead yet speaketh." Moving voices like that of the late John MacCormick may thus be heard.

Echoes are awakened when we visit old haunts, it may be where some familiar and well-beloved friend lived and the very place is vocal with memories.

In thinking of echoes we note that there are people who are little more than the "echoes of others." This is true of imitators, of which there are two classes. There are unconscious ones, such as children who copy their parents, or those among whom they have grown up. But besides these there are conscious imitators—speakers who imitate some one whom they admire. This is a pity; for it is not better for people to be themselves—to take the advice that Bishop Blougram gives in Browning's poem: "Best be thyself, imperial, plain and true." It is not possible that each one has some unique contribution to make to life? Besides one is apt to imitate what is of least worth in the other. Have we not sometimes heard that such a one makes us think of a some one whom he has obviously imitated in some little trick of gesture or expression?

There are moral echoes too. The disciples caught something from Jesus for the outside world "book knowledge that they had been with Him." There are intellectual echoes, for have we not often concluded from a man's speech, his conversation or literary product that he has been in the company of Browning Ruskin or Carlyle? There were echoes there of the influence of their thought.

In Tennyson's lovely poem, "The Princess" there are six little lyrics scattered through the work about the child—and its influence on home life. One of these little songs is about echoes. The last verse of the fourth reads thus:

"O love, they die in yon rich sky, They faint on hill or field or river, And grow for ever and forever."

Our echoes roll from soul to soul, And grow for ever and forever. There is an antithesis arising out of analogy between the echoes of a bugle on a mountain lake and that of soul on soul. While the merely physical echoes may die "like horns of Eiland faintly blowing, the echoes of moral influence grow for ever.

This truth has been put thus:

An Echo

"He deemed it dead—the sound of that which flew From his once careless hand, when morning dew

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So softly lay upon his verdant field; But, ah, that missile struck Convent's shield. It whizzed and sang above dead years, so when He stood on life's ere slopes. — They met again."
