Reports Read

The Health Report for the month of December was read by Dr. B. C. Keppeler, Provincial Health Officer. The meat and milk report was submitted by Dr. I. E. Croken. The council recommended that Dr. Croken instruct all milk vendors selling in the City to label their bottles in the future. These orders were issued for the purpose of protecting retail merchants against possible prosecution for selling milk containing sediment. It was also suggested that Dr. Croken and some members of the Council get in touch with the Milk Commission in an effort to protect the public in the purchasing of milk.

Among the communications was a letter from Mr. W. E. Scantlebury regarding the placing of the Mayor's name plates in the City and also number plates for the houses. Another letter from the Motor Transport informed the Council that the company would be forced to discontinue the City bus service this winter as it was not paying them.

Less On Relief

Reporting for the Employment and Relief Committee the Chairman, Councilor Lupton, said that the number of families on relief at the present was 461 as compared with 536 this time last year and a decrease of approximately 300 individual recipients under last year's figures.

Viscount Gort Gets Highest Military Award

WITH THE BRITISH EXPEDITIONARY FORCE IN FRANCE, Jan. 8 (CP)—In the presence of Winston Churchill, first lord of the Admiralty, the highest military honors today were conferred on General Viscount Gort, commander of the British forces in France, and General Ironside, chief of the imperial general staff.

Complimenting with an official decree of the King, the supreme commander of the allied armies, decorated each of the British generals with the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor.

Officials of both governments are reluctant to forecast the outcome of these new explorations of the \$500,000,000 project but the conference was proof at least that the administrations at Washington and Ottawa are now ready to pursue the negotiations to a conclusion.
