Combined Standing Fields and Threshed Grain Competition, 1932

Cash Prizes for Field of Oats, Wheat, Barley and Certified Seed Potatoes.

There will be competitions in the three counties where there are five or more entries each for Wheat, Barley, Oats and for Potatoes grown from Certified Seed.

The number of Prizes in each County will be proportionate with the number of entries. Prizes will be paid according to the combined score of the standing field and the threshed grain.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. A field of Oats shall consist of at least five acres, of Wheat and Barley three acres, of Certified Seed Potatoes two acres.
2. An entry fee of \$1.00 shall be charged for the first, and fifty cents for each additional entry of Grain, and \$1.00 for each entry of Potatoes.
3. The entry fee shall accompany the application.
4. Entries should be made to the Department of Agriculture not later than August 15th, 1932.
5. REGISTERED SEED ONLY. The field of Oats entered for inspection must be seeded with Registered Oats. Owing to the change in the regulations made by the Seed Branch, Ottawa, fields seeded with unregistered Oats will not be eligible for the competition.

University Women Meet In Edinburgh

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Aug. 3.—Thirty six nationalities, with 524 delegates, are represented at the sixth triennial conference of the International Federation of University Women which opens here tomorrow. Several Canadian women are present including Mrs. Douglas J. Thom, Regina, president of the Canadian Confederation; Miss Lalla G. Scott, Toronto, Convener of the Canadian committee on international relations.

and Miss M. L. Bollert, Vancouver. The federation, whose chief aim is the promotion of understanding between university women of all nations, was started in 1919 by two groups of university women in Great Britain and the United States. Since then it has grown to an organization with 36 national federations and a total membership of about 50,000.

Presiding over the conference will be Dr. Winifred Cullis, C. B. E., LL. D., professor of physiology at the University of London.

A leading speaker will be Dame Rachel Crowley, formerly chief of the Opium Traffic Section, League of Nations Secretariat, who was comm. of the V. A. D.'s in France and Belgium from 1914 to 1919. Another is Mrs. Margery Co rebbs Ashby, president of the International Woman's Suffrage Alliance, who has been a Liberal candidate in five general elections.

Notable Women Attend

Features of the conference program, held in the United Kingdom for the first time in 12 years, will be discussion of the work of the organization in favor of disarmament, addresses by the Duchess of Atholl, M. P.; Miss Amy Johnson, famous flier, and Dr. Harriet Chick, authority on vitamins. Group meetings will be held for the discussion of law, music, art and education.

Between now and August 4, delegates will attend many social functions, including a civic reception given by the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, a dinner with Scottish music and dancing, excursions into the country and a visit to the Edinburgh Zoological Gardens.

The chairman of the local committee of arrangements is Miss Charlotte Ansell, O. B. E., LL. D., sometime president of the Secondary Education Association of Scotland.

The headquarters of the conference are the George Watson Ladies' College, lent by the Edinburgh Merchant Company. The University Women's Union of Edinburgh have made all conference members honor ary members of the union, placing their buildings at the disposal of the members as a club house.

MODERN PROSPECTING BY MAGNETIC METHODS

OTTAWA, Canada, Aug. 3.—Valuable minerals which are themselves magnetic can be located by the tiny magnetic forces which sometimes characterize the rock formations in which the ore deposits are found. Heretofore magnetic prospecting for minerals has been confined for the most part to the use of comparatively insensitive instruments such as the miner's dip needle in the investigation of iron ore deposits. 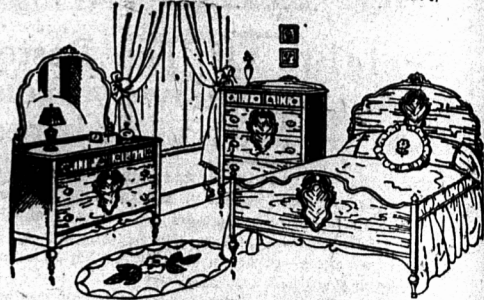

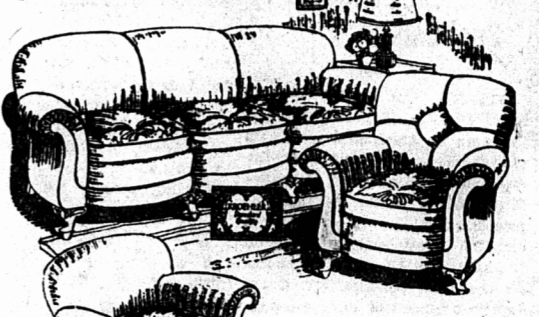

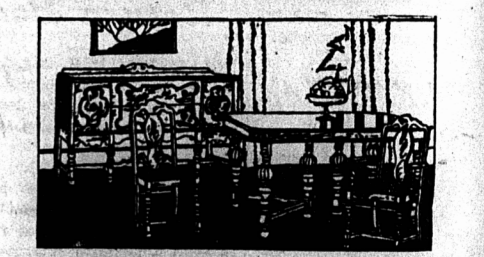

cle instruments has opened up an almost new field of prospecting. Investigations with these instruments by the Dominion Observatory, Department of the Interior, have shown that it is possible in certain cases to determine accurately the positions of fractures and other peculiarities lying concealed in the rock formations at considerable depths below the surface. In co-operation with the Geological Survey investigations are at present in progress at Theford, Quebec, for the purpose of investi-

gating the use of the instruments in locating new deposits of asbestos.

STREAM FLOW IN QUEBEC DURING MAY

OTTAWA, Canada, Aug. 3.—The Dominion Water Power and Hydroelectric Bureau, of the Department of the Interior reports that the flow of the St. Lawrence river, which is also modified by storage, was 70 per cent of the May average. Farther east in the Matane area the flow was about 25 per cent above normal. In the northern part of the province, as indicated by the records of the Harricana river at

the Amos, the run-off was only a trifling above 60 per cent of the May average.
