USE STEEL INSTEAD OF PLATINUM IN DENTISTRY

JENA, Germany, Mar 23.—Knives and forks which may be boiled with vinegar or left in contact with eggs for a long time without tarnishing are now said to be possible through the use of a new steel known as "V 2 A" manufactured by the Krupp works at Essen. The steel is claimed to be proof against all ordinary chemicals except hydrochloric acid and is unattackable by atmospheric agents. It may be used instead of platinum for dentistry and other purposes.



TWO-MILLION DOLLAR ACTION TO BE RESUMED

MONTREAL, March 23.—Word was received by the Montreal representatives of the prosecution this morning that the two million dollar breach of contract action taken against the St. Lawrence Sugar Refineries, Ltd., by the Milled Food Brokerage Company, of Chicago and New York is on the roll of the supreme court of New York county for jury trial tomorrow, but will probably come up for hearing on Monday next.

The action is for \$2,388,064 and is a claim for damages based on certain deliveries of sugar, which the plaintiff's hold were contracted for and should have been made in 1920 and which the defence claims they were prevented from making, owing to an embargo placed on sugar exports by the Canadian government.
