Warn Against Heavy Use Of Weed-killer

(By The Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Dec. 13—The Agriculture Department today warned against heavy use of the new weed-killer 2,4-D on field crops, disclosing that application in too large amounts can injure grain and sharply reduce yield.

Although a light application of the weed-killer often boosts the yield of field crops because it kills many weeds, experiments by the Department show the danger of too-heavy applications.

George Knowles, Field Husbandry Division, Central Experimental Farm here, today described the results of experiments conducted this year in several parts of Canada.

It was found that "some grain crops, such as flax and oats are more susceptible to 2,4-D than are wheat and barley," he stated. In addition, "some brands of the chemical appear to be more harmful than others."

A new method of applying the chemical on mustard-infested wheat gave good results when tested at the Central Experimental Farm and at two points in the Prairie Provinces this summer.

In some of these tests less than one pint of a certain brand of 20 per cent 2,4-D, applied in only 4 1/2 gallons of water per acre killed practically 100 per cent of the mustard and increased the wheat yield by two to three bushels an acre.

THE KIRK PULPIT

Preaching last evening on the theme "On Calling a Spade, a Spade" and basing his remarks on the words of Christ "And if thine eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee" (Matthew 18:9) the Minister, the Rev'd. T. H. Buswell Somers, said: Now I need not say that I believe in psychology and in the methods of psychology. I believe in social guidance. I believe in progressive education. I believe in the sound doctrine that the natural proclivities of children should be developed and that a child's education should be in harmony with its understanding and experience. I understand that we cannot label as sin everything which offends our personal tastes, nor can we call sin everything which in fact is a deep malady of the mind. There are minds that are twisted; there are emotions that are bottled up; there are people who are frustrated. These people are not to be condemned, and they are not to be stigmatized. The things they do are not to be called onerous and damnable. These people are sick. They need the hand of a physician. They need special and secure guidance. But there is a limit beyond which we cannot go. There is something deeper than that. There is a moral paralysis which the physician cannot cure. There is a distortion of intention which no neurologist can untwist. There is a sinfulness which no psychology in the world can explain away. It simply will not do to change the Creed from "I believe in the forgiveness of sins" to "I believe in the forgiveness of abnormality." It simply will not do to change the words of the Psalmist, "Hold not my secret sin against me" to "Hold not my maladjustment against me." It is when adjustment fails that we begin to realize how unrealistic we have been. Aberration needs no forgiveness; it needs healing. Abnormality needs no forgiveness; it needs cure. Maladjustment needs no pardon; it needs guidance. But sin and evil do need forgiveness, and they do need our honest and courageous handling. Of course, we do not want to develop in the children a guilt complex. We do not want the children to grow up with a distorted conscience. But we do want the children to grow up with a deep sense of right and wrong, and we do want the children to grow up with an understanding of what right and wrong invariably and inescapably lead to.
