The date fixed by the Canadian Railway War Board for the opening of the railway freight sheds for the receipt and delivery of freight at 7.30 a. m. daily and their closing at 5.00 p. m. daily excepting on Saturday, on which day they are to be closed at 1 p. m. has been extended under its direction from the 15th October to the 10th November.

The public is therefore advised that the regulations at present governing the opening and closing of freight sheds on the Canadian Government Railways will continue in force until the last named date.

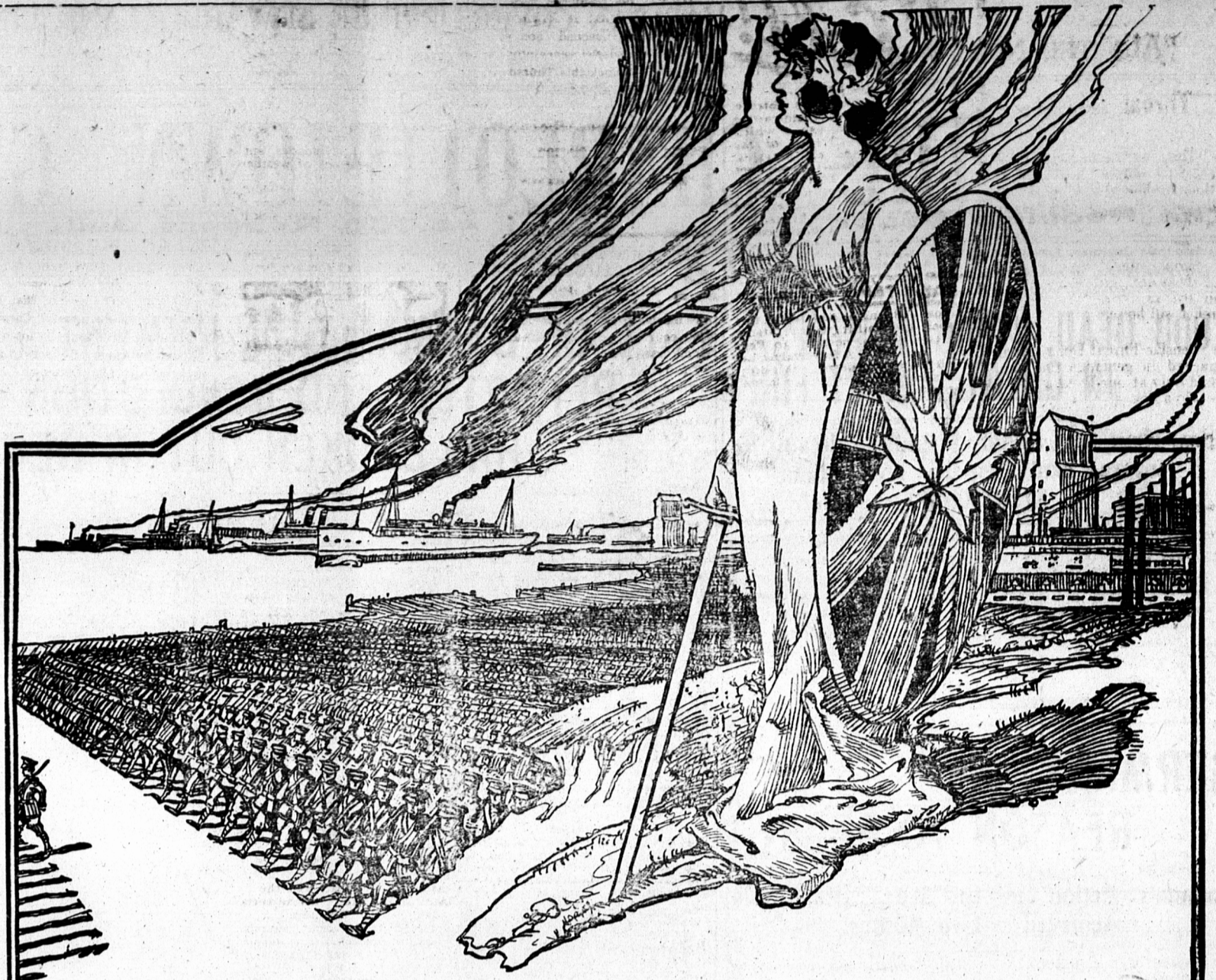

Synopsis of Canadian Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homestead is a good stand homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties Six months residence in each of three years after expiry homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$7.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 30 acres and erect house worth \$300.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rocky, scrubby or stony soil. Live stock may be submitted for cultivation under certain conditions.
