MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE

DEADWOOD, S. D., Oct. 11.—For the first time in ten years the jury here today returned the death verdict in the trial of Charles Hayer, alias Wm. Dunn, for the murder of Fred Samuelson, at Spearfish, two months ago. After a sensational trial in which the girl sweetheart of the two men, was the star witness for the state, the jury remained out but two and a half hours and returned a verdict of guilty in the first degree with the recommendation that Dunn be hanged. While public sentiment was strongly against the prisoner the severity of the verdict was totally unexpected. Jealousy over the affections of the girl, Lena Schaar, caused the crime for which Dunn must suffer. Dunn found Samuelson and the girl love-making in a corn field and shot the man without warning.

MRS EDISON MAY LOOSE \$8,000,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Suits pending against Thomas A. Edison and his companies for seven years are expected to end this month by a judgment of \$8,000,000 against the inventor. The actions have been fought by capitalists organized to sell the Edison patents under a general company, the North American. The original inventor got into difficulty, Edison is said to have offered to conduct the sales himself for two years. Later the assets of the \$6,000,000 organization were sold under the hammer for \$125,000 to Frederick P. Ott, who is said to have acted for the inventor. Then Edison, it is declared, organized the National as a sales company and members of the original North American Company who claim they were sold out by Edison, now demand a part of the profits.

EM. RESS SMASHED CANADIAN RECORDS

MONTREAL, Oct. 11.—A remarkable performance was brought to an end today and a trans-Atlantic record established by the arrival in Quebec of the Empress of Ireland of the C. P. R. The liner left Liverpool last Friday night and reached Quebec at four o'clock this afternoon in time to get her passengers to Montreal in special trains to catch the regular train for the West. The passengers who left Liverpool last Friday will be in Toronto tomorrow morning, or if they took the main line of the C. P. R., will reach Winnipeg on Saturday evening, just eight days from Liverpool. Mails posted in London at noon last Friday were delivered in Montreal tonight. This breaks all Canadian records.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD NEXT YEAR IN ST. JOHN

TRURO, October 11.—The Presbyterian synod took a brief but strenuous labors by its visit to the provincial agricultural farm at Bible Hill. The visitors observed with keen understanding the points of interest. That their professional careers and duties have not blinded their eyes to the practical side of life was very apparent. This forenoon's session was devoted to Sabbath schools, young people's societies and church life and work in the order named. Able and interesting addresses were given by J. H. A. Anderson, D. N. McRae, A. Myers, F. L. Jobb, and W. B. Cooper, general secretary of the Canadian Bible Society. Second reports were received from the following committees—Committee on co-operation with the Methodist church, and committee on widows and orphans' fund. The application of N. C. Hannay, from the American Presbyterian church, was duly considered and he was received. Fitting tributes were paid to the memory of seven deceased clergymen removed during the past year. The appointment of standing committees was carried out, and the work of the synod for 1908 concluded. St. David's church, St. John, will be the meeting place of this body in 1909.
