Second Period Scoring Spurge Gives Halifax Squad 2-1 Victory.

(Canadian Press) (By Guardian's Special Wire) Halifax, Feb. 14.—A scoring spree that netted a brace of goals in a brief half-minute gave Halifax Wolves a 2-1 edge over Charlottetown Abbies tonight and the second-place Wolves in the race of the light for Maritime Hockey League honors.

Huge Crowd Sees Leafs Triumph Over All-Star Six

Leaders Of Canadian Section On Long-End Of 7-3 Count.

(By Guardian's Special Wire) MAPLE LEAF GARDEENS, Toronto, Feb. 14.—Toronto Maple Leafs overwhelmed the National Hockey League's all-star team 7-3 tonight before a crowd of 14,074 which paid \$20,908 into a fund for the injured Edwin (Ace) Bailey, Left right winger.

Hockey hit a new high as a spectacle as the greatest players in the game, assembled for the first time for a single contest, blazed speed, peering and terrific shooting into a battle that was thrilling only because of the famous performers.

The ill-set was a disorganized unit from the first and the Leafs, leaders of the N. H. L. Canadian Section and League Champions last season, jumped ahead in the first period and rattled in three without a reply in the third after being outplayed in the middle stanza.

But for a show it was unprecedented. Bailey himself took off the puck for the start and took part in a lengthy, colorful preliminary ceremony. It was the first public appearance of the Ace, whose injuries received in a game at Boston in December, nearly cost him his life and will keep him out of hockey.

Thunderous applause greeted Bailey and when Eddie Shore, Boston Bruins defenceman who charged the Ace to the ice in the Boston game, shook hands with the former Toronto star, the crowd shook the rafters with noise. Every move made by Shore—once the favorite "bad man" when he played here—was cheered during the game.

Harvey Jackson, brilliant Toronto left winger, led the Leafs to their triumph with two goals and an assist. What it was a defence combination of Lionel Conacher and Shore, or Shore and Ching Johnson or Allan Shields and Red Dutton that faced him, black-haired giant rick ripped through for shots on acrobatic Chuck Gardner, Chicago Black Hawk ace, who kicked, threw and batted off 45 shots during a flashy exhibition.

Lanky Andy Blair also picked his spots, scoring near the end of the third period when he did something about a two-goal deficit his collection of stars was laboring under.
