Senior Rugby League Opens On Wednesday

Premier J. Walter Jones will kick-off here Wednesday afternoon to launch the senior rugby league. It was announced yesterday. The opening match will be between St. Dunstan's University and the Royal Air Force. The third team in the league is the R.C.A.F. from Summerside.

The R.A.F. and the Saints have met twice already this year in exhibition contests, with the airmen taking both of them. However, the Saints made a better showing in the second match and were within a single point of their opponents. This time with the leadership in the newly formed league at stake the interest should be at fever pitch. The game will be played on the St. Dunstan's field.

Red Wings Lineup Still Not Complete

DETROIT, Oct. 25—(CP)—Manager Jack Adams is just about decided on the men he wants to have on his 1944-45 Detroit Red Wings but his pre-season work is far from finished. He still hasn't signed a single Detroit veteran to a contract and must do so within the next six days before Wings open their National Hockey League season Sunday against New York.

"We intend to start contract negotiations with our veterans Tuesday," said Adams today. "We don't expect to have much trouble."

Football Rivalry In Nazi Prison

LEITH, Scotland, Oct. 25—(CP)—Traditional football rivalry between eastern and western Canada extended even to German prison camps repatriated Canadian service men said on their arrival here today. The prisoners formed football teams and the west won a recent game 13-12.

Durocher To Manage Dodgers in 1944

NEW YORK, Oct. 25—(AP)—Leo Durocher, who was released as a player-manager about a month ago, again will manage the Brooklyn Dodgers of the national baseball league in 1944. President Branch Rickey announced today.

The contract is for one year and is to manage only. The terms were not disclosed, but Durocher said "it is the best contract I've ever had since I've been in baseball." Rickey himself, in response to a suggestion that the document which replaces a player-manager contract Durocher had this year, called for a substantial salary cut, warned that he wouldn't advise anyone to "go out on a limb on that."

American Hockey League Season Opens Tonight

CLEVELAND, Oct. 25—(AP)—The American Hockey League season starts tomorrow night with the Cleveland Barons and the Pittsburgh Hornets playing a war benefit game, \$1,000 going to the Disabled Veterans Fund of Windsor, Ont., and the balance to the Cleveland Stage Door canteen.

Bun Cook, for six years coach at Providence makes his debut as Barons pilot, succeeding his brother who now is Barons general manager. Larry Aurie again will be at the Hornets' helm.

Cleveland will line up with Paul Gauthier, formerly of Washington, at goal; Dick Adolph and Yip Foster at defence; Whitey Prokop, Mike Shabaga and Pete Horeck on the front line with a good handful of veterans in reserve. Pittsburgh has a veteran team including Goalie Harvey Teno, defencemen Pete Besnon and Chuck Shannon, wings Tony Flemering, Wendell Jamieson and Lloyd Roubell.

The Barons, who practice in the evenings this season because four players and daytime war plant jobs will play at Pittsburgh Wednesday night, Indianapolis, Buffalo, Hershey and Providence, the league's other members, all will see action by Saturday.

She stressed the importance of proper canning and storage, by prevention of waste due to improper preparation and cooking. The duty of every woman is to learn as much as possible about nutrition and to use that knowledge every day she declared.

Notre Dame Alumnae Home Coming Sunday

Home Coming Sunday was observed by the members of the Notre Dame Alumnae Association on Oct. 24. The proceedings opened with prayer and the singing of "O Canada."

The President, in welcoming the members, had a special word of greeting for Rev. Mother St. Mary Baptist, recently appointed Assistant Superior and Rev. Mother St. Adolphe Marie, music teacher. She made reference to the sorrowful plight of Pope Pius XII in far away Vatican City and urged those present to join with his Holiness in praying for him to grant us a speedy "Peace with Justice." The President also spoke of the great benefit of a Christian education and of the debt of gratitude we owe to the Sisters who have taught us with so much devotion.

The Rev. Sisters who attended the Summer School were called upon to present their reports which were listened to with keen interest. St. Augustine gave a general idea of the organization of the Summer School of Catholic Action; the enthusiasm of the large number of delegates who attended; the magnificence and suitability of Loyola University as the site of the Summer School and a resume of the lengthy and diversified course which were open to the delegates.

St. Adolphe described Father Lord's lectures on the subject, "The Social Spirit of the Saviour" or, in other words, seeking the root of those among whom we live, according to the teaching and example of Christ and studied in the light of the Gospel passages. She also summarized Father Lyon's course on Leadership, mentioning particularly the personal qualities required of a leader in any organization, how these qualities may be acquired, and the duties and responsibilities of a leader.

St. Margaret displayed a number of paintings from still life which she had made at her summer course at Mount Allison University. They were also some beautiful purses, book-ends, belts, etc. in hand-tooled leather.

The Sisters expressed deep appreciation for these courses which were given by the Notre Dame Alumnae as their contribution to the scholarship fund of the Federation of Catholic Alumnae.

After Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament which was given in the Convent chapel, the members returned to the Academy Hall where refreshments were served.

The function closed with singing of the National Anthem.

Fish Landings in Maritimes

HALIFAX, Oct. 25—(CP)—Fish landings in the Maritimes during September showed substantial increases in both weight and landed value over the same period in 1942. It was shown in the monthly report of A. L. Barry, Superintendent of the Eastern Fisheries Division.

Last month, 45,037,400 pounds of fish with a value of \$1,706,742 were landed, compared with 44,711,000 pounds valued at \$1,389,526 a year ago.

Cod landings increased by 487,100 pounds and were worth \$64,234 more to the deep sea fishermen. The lobster catch was 888,800 pounds lower, but higher prices made it worth \$9,880 more. The sardine harvest was 937,600 pounds less than in September last year, but was worth \$747 more.

By provinces, Nova Scotia showed increases of 3,222,800 pounds and \$123,727 in fisheries. New Brunswick catch was down 4,181,600 pounds in weight but up \$30,931 in landed value, while Prince Edward Island fishermen landed 1,355,200 pounds more fish last month to increase their incomes by \$64,459.

TOO FEW HOUSES

TORONTO, Oct. 25—(CP)—Officials of the Local Wartime Housing Registry Branch said today that results of the recent federal order requiring branch owners of vacant housing accommodation to let it with the registry have been disappointing. There are around 1,200 families on the list waiting for housing accommodation here.

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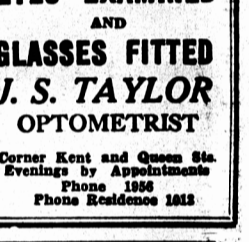
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
