YESTERDAY a report was in circulation in the city that owing to the continued drought a shortage of the city's water supply is inevitable. In consequence a GUARDIAN representative waited upon one of the water commissioners to ascertain the exact condition. He stated that the well is lower than ever before but there is no danger. As soon as the pumps cease the water rises again, of course not as high as in other years. Owing to the drought more water is being used on the lawns and flowers, not to speak of sewerage. At the present time 650,000 gallons of water is pumped into the reservoir which means a consumption of 160,000 gallons over last year. At the present time there are 1800 water takers. It is estimated that at least 1,000 will place sewers. When this occurs the water supply will be found to be inadequate. At the present time between four and five hundred are using the sewers.
