MR. PREFONTAINE'S VISIT.

We think the occasion of the visit of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to our Province ought to be signalled by a renewed presentation of our claims to better treatment at the Land of the federal government. Especially ought we in a public way to bring to the minister's notice those matters which have to do with provincial intercommunication. It was one great object of confederation to not only give free trade between the Provinces, but to facilitate all forms of commercial, business and social intercourse so as to make the population of the Dominion one people, mutually acquainted and unitedly desirous to work together in building up a great and prosperous nation.

To this end the federal authority was entrusted with the task of securing uniform and equal postal service throughout the Dominion, and were bound by compact to maintain regular telegraph service and daily steam communication between the Island and the mainland. But our experience has been that our winter steam service has been sadly intermittent and unsatisfactory, and as the result of this our mails have been very irregular and frequently delayed for days and even a week or more at a time. This in turn renders the telegraph service to and from the mainland of increased importance, but our people are compelled to put up with a twelve hour service each day, and to pay double the rates which are charged on the mainland. A third and stronger steamer is absolutely necessary to our efficient winter service, alike for the mails, passengers and freight, and an improved telegraph service is a crying need.

Another matter of much importance is that the railway, postal and marine authorities have not hitherto worked in accord, and our winter difficulties and delays have been increased on that account. These are matters in regard to which all our people are agreed, and all, of whatever party are most desirous to have the conditions of these several services improved. The winter season is now close upon us and all are conscious of the need of having a great improvement upon the service of last winter. We have sent delegations to Ottawa about one or other of these matters. We have complained that our representatives in Parliament have failed to obtain redress or improvement.

We therefore think that these matters ought to be urged upon the attention of Hon. Mr. Prefontaine and through him urged upon the Government by the people of this city and province while he is here. Earnestness and vigor are obviously needed if we are to gain an effective hearing, and action must be taken with promptitude as the minister's visit may be brief.

Our people are glad to have a federal minister make us a visit. Possibly we have not done our whole duty in the way of extending invitations. It might be well to invite the Postmaster General and the Minister or Acting Minister of Railways here, that they may become better acquainted with the people, with our local circumstances and the urgency of our needs. We venture that they would take a deeper and more appreciative interest if here on the spot than they will ever take in the distant and chilly atmosphere of Ottawa. Let them come one by one or all together, but it is our duty to point out clearly and forcibly to each of them the things imperatively necessary to be done and to which we are justly entitled. Let us begin with making Mr. Prefontaine fully aware of our present disabilities and our determination to have them remedied.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPH PROSPECTS.

Mr Marconi recently crossed from New York to Liverpool on the S S Lucania and has since been talking very confidently about the early commencement of commercial telegraphic business across the Atlantic by his method. It is true that he talked in a very similar strain two years ago when he first succeeded in exchanging signals between Newfoundland and Wales. But he has something more to go upon now. He says that from the day the steamer left New York she was in constant communication with England and America. When the vessel reached mid-Atlantic communication was established with England a distance of 1,400 miles. This was the first time that messages have been received daily on board a liner on the Atlantic. The Mayor of Canterbury sent an invitation, addressed "Marconi, Lucania. Somewhere on the Atlantic," asking Mr Marconi to luncheon on his visit to Canterbury. Mr. Marconi duly received the message, and replied accepting the invitation. The general public have been impatient of being fed upon mere promises for so long a time, but it is not so very surprising that an invention or discovery of such transcendent possibilities should take a good deal of time to develop.

On Tuesday last full state tickets were voted for in seven States, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, Ohio, Kentucky, Iowa and Mississippi, while in New York, Pennsylvania, Nebraska and Colorado minor state officers were chosen. The Prohibitionists had a ticket in each of these states except Colorado, the Populists had tickets in Iowa and Colorado, and the Socialist Labor party had tickets in New York, Massachusetts and Ohio. These were in addition to the regular Republican and Democratic tickets.
