Campbell who had been playing centre, to which position Pye was moved. Bell did nice work forward until he and Doucette collided, Bell pulling off a skate and had to be substituted by Gardiner who made a splendid showing, playing first class combination with Howatt of the Nationals who, with Gardiner's assistance, scored the final goal of the game.

In the Eastern League game last night at Moncton, the Sussex team defeated Moncton in their own rink by a score of 5-2.


