A resolution of appreciation for this magnificent gift was then placed on the books. The meeting was unanimous in expressing the opinion that never was Long River congregation better off spiritually or financially, and with the prospect of becoming part of Kensington congregation and of being permanently ministered to by Mr. Ayers the future is bright with promise.
