**Home After Eventful Trip**

Marooned in England, unable to obtain passage on a boat sailing for Canada for a time after the hostilities in Europe, Mrs. Hugh McGuire (formerly Miss Jennie McPherson) arrived home last night and told of her experiences on her visit of three months to England, Ireland and Scotland.  
Mrs. McGuire had booked passage on the ill-fated Athenia but fortunately cancelled her booking and sailed in another boat recently arriving in Montreal safely.  
This Islander witnessed air raid alarms, blackouts and other war time precautions while in London and expressed her delight at being home once again where things are quieter.

**Praises Maritime Contribution To Cooperation**

A capacity crowd at Prince of Wales College Hall last night heard Mr. Bertram B. Fowler of New York declare that "the Maritime provinces are contributing a significant part of the cooperative movement that is recognized over the whole of North America."  
The students of the Youth Training League attended en masse with a large sprinkling of citizens interested in the cooperative movement. Dr. Murphy, Principal of St. Dunstan's, presided as chairman and introduced the speaker.  
"The theory of democracy said Mr. Fowler is based on Christian ethics, but in many respects the practice of it is a mere shell of the true theory. Some day we may get a clue to making the theory work. H. L. Mencken in derision has said "Democracy is the theory that the people get what they want, and deserve to get it—good and bad." In America while the pioneers were settling the west, sweat shops were forming in the east. Now two per cent of the people control 80 per cent of the wealth. The cooperative movement in its various forms is an attempt to remedy this situation. It is not a matter merely of credit unions, labor unions, marketing coops, and so on, it is something larger, a matter of education on a high basis. The deep significance of cooperation is economic Christianity. That has been the significant thing about the movement in the Maritime. It is based on the realization of that fact. This dynamic is the spirit which older cooperatives are trying to find from the Maritime movement.  
Individualism in agriculture is suicidal under today's conditions. Farm tenancy is on the increase in many parts of America. In Iowa last year 7,000 farms were foreclosed by one big New York insurance company. The present war is going to speed up this tendency. Increased agricultural production is a dangerous game for the farmer unless he takes adequate precaution against the time when after the war production will decrease and prices fall. We have not yet finished paying for the last depression. We are not helpless. We can educate ourselves for action. The cooperative movement is the first declaration of independence on this continent. The people of North America are on the march. They have found that they can run their own business.  
Many questions were thrown at the lecturer at the conclusion of his talk and a most interesting discussion continued for some time. A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. W. R. Shaw and seconded by Mr. Stuart Wright. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.
