THE TERRORS OF A ZEPPELIN RAID

Mr. Harrison, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Charlottetown, recently received a letter from his mother in England, enclosing one to her from his daughter at Maldstone, Eng., in which a Zeppelin scare is somewhat thrillingly described. After expressing gratitude that her mother and other members of the family were not at home, they being at the seaside, the writer proceeds:—"A Zeppelin went over Maldstone at midnight and passed right over the home and garden of—(neighboring house)." "I was very watchful last night and feeling something was going to happen. I was reading in bed at about a quarter to 12, when I heard the sound of heavy guns, which rattled my door. This happened three times and I went in to the night nursery. Nurse was awake and hearing the guns we looked out and saw a searchlight. The firing seemed very heavy. The Nichols were all at the back of their house and the boys in the garden. We heard a funny noise and Leslie called up he was sure it was a Zeppelin. He went to the bottom of the garden and in a few minutes ran back saying a Zeppelin was coming straight over the garden. I told Nurse to get baby and take her down. I got Tony while Sadie held the candle which I had luckily taken into the room. We turned on no light. Just as we left the window the siren started. We all felt ghastly, thinking every minute we should get a bomb on us. We ran down to the drawing room and I laid Tony on the floor in blankets. Then—and I went to the cellar and turned off the gas and electric light. By that time the thing had gone over in the direction of London and about twenty to two the siren blew to show that the danger was over but we stayed downstairs until daylight." Then follows a graphic account of the rumors circulated on the following day, rumors which could neither be confirmed nor disputed as the papers never mentioned the incident. It was found subsequently that some of the reports turned out to be untrue and that no material damage was done in the neighborhood. One bomb missed the Tilbury Hotel by 20 yards and a warehouse filled with war munitions by 8 feet. Three bombs were dropped on Gravesend but no one was killed. One exploded about half a mile from the fort. The letter voices in a plain matter of fact way the constant apprehension which has really developed into a gnawing fear of an ever-present danger. Those whose lot has been cast outside of the war zone have much to be thankful for and should do their bit to bring this state of terror and murder to an end.
