So great has been the demand for Bulletins, Pamphlets, Records and Reports upon the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa as a result of the Patriotism and Production Movement, that it has been found impossible to comply with all the applications as promptly as could be desired. Of some of the Bulletins the supply has been exhausted and no time has been afforded for reprinting, while of others the quantity asked for individually has been such that instant compliance would mean many applicants might have to go without. This has meant extra correspondence and consequent delay. The situation is, of course, satisfactory as indicating the success of the campaign, and the widespread interest created, but the inability to respond on the instant with the multitude of applications is greatly regretted. At the same time it is impossible that the size of the demand could have been foreseen. As fast as possible the requests will be attended to, but in the meantime there will have to be reprinting and in cases revising. In such circumstances patience appears to be a desirable and necessary quality.

IN MEMORIAM

LATE MRS. A. S. HEWITT.

It is with sincere regret that The Guardian announces the death of Mrs. A. S. Hewitt, which occurred at her home on King street, last evening.

The late Mrs. Hewitt had been in a falling health for some time but nevertheless her friends continued to entertain hopes of her recovery and her death comes as a great shock.

The deceased lady was formerly Miss Martina McKinnon and was first married to Mr. Richard Coady. Some years ago she married Mr. A. S. Hewitt, who survives her.

She was noted for her charity and her kindly deeds will long be remembered by many. Her willing assistance in promoting the interests of the Charlottetown Hospital was a characteristic which could always be relied upon and her death leaves a sad blank in the ranks of the helpers of that institution.

She was about 62 years of age and leaves to mourn, besides her husband, one daughter, Mrs. J. McKenna, two sisters and one brother.

The funeral takes place Friday morning at 8.45 o'clock.

MR FRANCIS DALTON

Words fail to express the anxiety that was felt in Glangarry on Friday, March 19th, when it was known, that Mr. Ambrose Dalton had received a telegram from Maltham, Massachusetts, stating, that his son Francis was dangerously ill with typhoid fever.

For the remainder of the day and through the long and lonely hours of night, the anxious parents, brothers, and sisters hoped and prayed, that the deadly disease might not prove fatal, but their hopes were in vain as the morning brought the sad news their beloved one lay cold in death.

Deceased was a young man of eighteen years of age and was working in the United States for the last two years. Endowed with a very ambitious nature he left home at the tender age of sixteen years and had almost mastered the trade of a machinist, when death ended his earthly career.

In addition to his working at the above trade he was attending night school for the purpose of studying bookkeeping. His mental and manual labor greatly undermined his health and although he received the most skillful medical treatment and good nursing, typhoid fever found in him an easy victim. He was a patient at the Waltham Hospital for three weeks where an operation was performed on him two days before his death from the effects of which he never rallied.

His death is particularly sad on account of his dying so far from home, with none of his loved ones near him. In their absence he received the kind attention of devoted relatives and friends one of whom accompanied the remains to the island. He was noted for his exemplary character, quiet and inoffensive disposition and engaging personality. The consoling and sympathetic letters which his parents received from his comrades, from his

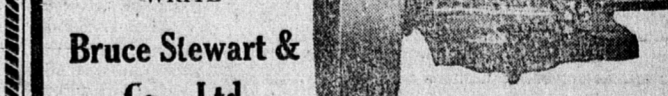
