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U. S. May Seek Extradition Of Klaus Fuchs

(By Marvin L. Arrowsmith) WASHINGTON, Feb. 5 (AP) — Chairman Brian McMahon (Dem. Conn.) said tonight that the congressional atomic committee is exploring the possibility of American extradition of Klaus Fuchs, the British scientist suspected of passing atomic and hydrogen bomb secrets to Russia.

The Connecticut Senator added, however, that preliminary study by the committee's lawyers has raised doubt as to whether any effort to force Fuchs to come to the United States for possible trial would succeed.

Fuchs, 38, is a native of Germany but a British subject. He was arrested in London last week on charges of violating Britain's Official Secrets Act.

Five From City To Make Flight To Big 'Spiel'

Five Charlottetownians will be on the plane that has been chartered to fly to Vancouver early in March in time for the passengers to witness the Dominion Curling Championship games. The plane is scheduled to take off on Friday, March 3rd, carrying twenty-one passengers from the Maritimes and, according to an article in a Vancouver paper, the curling fans can expect to have excellent seats waiting for them to witness the roaring games which start on March 6th.

Leaving here at 8:30 a.m. the aircraft's first stop will be in Fredericton where it will pick up the mainland passengers, and then on to Montreal to refuel. It is scheduled to reach Fort William the same night and it is understood that hotel arrangements have been made there for the passengers.

Plane will renew its flight Saturday morning with Lethbridge, Alberta as its destination for the return trip on again in the morning in order to reach Vancouver by noon on Sunday, March 5th, where hotel accommodations will await them.

During the week's stay on the west coast, plans are made to visit Victoria on one day, and the plane is scheduled to start on its return trip on Sunday, March 12th. Stopovers on the way back to the East will include one day in Calgary, two days in Winnipeg and two days in Toronto, arriving home on Sunday, March 19th.

12 Below Zero Reported Here

The thermometer dipped to 12 below at the Meteorological Station, Charlottetown Airport last night to give the central section of the Island its lowest temperature recording during the past couple of seasons. Recordings at the Summerside Meteorological Station read six below.

Although the thermometer did not show it, most people thought it was as cold if not colder during the morning and afternoon as it was last night. During the morning a 20-mile-per-hour wind was blowing with gusts as high as 32. The wind velocity at 11 o'clock last night was 6 m.p.h.

Recordings showed that the temperature was below zero all day with the reading seven below at 6 o'clock yesterday evening. One hour later it read nine below, and at 8 o'clock it was 11 below. It dropped to 12 below at 9 o'clock where it remained for the next two hours. At midnight it had raised two degrees to 10 below. Forecasts indicate that it would drop to 15 in the early part of the morning.

No Trace Of Missing Plane

WHITEHORSE, Y. T. Feb. 5 (CP) — Two more radio signals of no value were added tonight to the long list of clues checked and discarded in the 10-day search for a United States Skymaster missed by 44 persons.

The signals were picked up at different times today by planes sweeping the Yukon's snow-capped mountains on the 10th day of the search. A check showed both signals had originated near Denmark.

Skies cleared early today in the southwestern Yukon after a snowstorm, and 12 planes were sent out to make another sweep of the main search area there. The planes were diverted to an area north of Whitehorse.

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C.N.R. Vice President



MONTREAL, February 5 — Donald Gordon, C.M.G., president, Canadian National Railways, yesterday announced the appointment of Stanley F. Dingle (above) to be vice-president in charge of operation with system jurisdiction.

The new vice-president, who is in his 49th year, has had thirty years' experience in the engineering and operating departments of the Canadian National System and its predecessor companies. He has served on operating and special committees of the Association of the Railway Association of Canada, and is widely known in transportation and business circles throughout Canada and the United States.

The departments which Mr. Dingle will now head were formerly under the direction of the late N.B. Walton, C.N.R. vice-president, who died last month. Included in them are the operating forces on the 24,000 miles of the Canadian National System in Canada and in the United States concerned with the operation of train services, terminals, right of way and equipment of all kinds.

He started his railway career in 1920 in the engineering department of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, a predecessor company of the Canadian National, at Winnipeg.

He was divisional superintendent at Winnipeg from 1942 to 1944 when he was appointed general superintendent in charge of the Alberta district, an operating territory with 2,465 miles of railway, with headquarters at Edmonton.

In 1946 he was chief of the transportation post of the Canadian National with headquarters at Montreal. He was chosen by the late N.B. Walton in 1948 to be assistant vice-president of operation, a post which he has occupied until the present time.

Formerly Miss Charlotte MacMillan, Mrs. Tweedy was a native of Albert Plains but resided at her married life at Vernon River, where she took a leading part in community activities. She was an active member of the United Church and of the Women's Missionary Society, and also of the Women's Institute in the early days of its organization.

Her husband, Mr. Cephas B. Tweedy, died thirty-four years ago and by strength of character, patience and self-sacrifice she kept the home together while her children were small, and added many improvements from time to time. She was particularly fond of flowers, and always kept a lovely garden.
