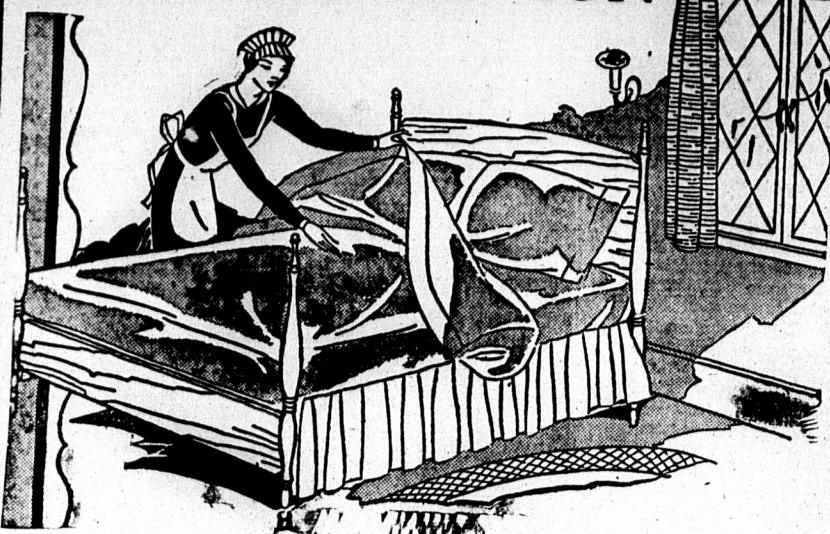

TORONTO, Ont., April 14 — (By The Canadian Press)—Tribute to noted missionary workers who died during the past year was paid today by the Foreign Mission Board of the United Church of Canada, in a special service here.

Those remembered included: Rev. Joseph Annand, of Hantsport, N. S., last surviving missionary of the old Hebrides mission; Miss B. G. McNaughton of Huntington, Que., burned to death in her Mission Hospital at Chungking, China, and Rev. S. W. Falls, of the United Church publishing house here, who was closely associated with missionary endeavor.

WASHINGTON, April 14.—The most amazing development in national politics is the sudden outburst of confidence on the part of Republican leaders and, particularly, officials of the administration, that the nomination of Franklin D. Roosevelt, which they now regard as virtually assured, will mean the reelection of President Hoover.

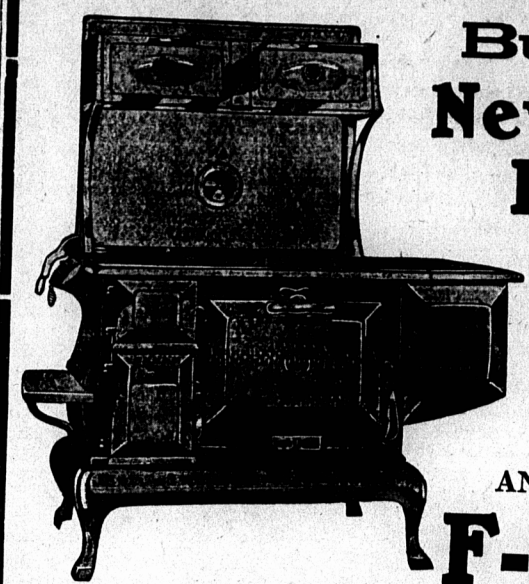
PRINCE ADVISES HOTEL MANAGERS

PLAYS FOR VILLAGE DRAMA SOCIETIES

OXFORD, Eng., April 13. (By The Canadian Press)—Several distinguished writers have presented copies of their own plays to a library of plays which has just been formed at Oxford for the use of village drama societies. Professor Gilbert Murray has given a volume of his translations of Greek plays, and among other donors are Laurence Housman and Mrs. John Buchan. The headquarters of the new library are at Barnett House and for a small subscription village drama societies may take out plays. Side by side with the library scheme the villages themselves are to be encouraged to write plays and to send them to be considered by qualified judges at Oxford. One play, written by a village working man and based on Dickens' "Tale of Two Cities" has already been submitted.

ART HISTORIANS TO MEET NEXT YEAR

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 14.—(By The Canadian Press)—An international Congress for art historians will be held in Stockholm, Sept. 3-5, 1933, as decided at the 12th congress in Brussels 1930. On this occasion scholars are expected to come to Stockholm from many parts of the world, and elaborate arrangements will be made to receive them. The work of the congress will be carried on in eight sections. Among the collections to be demonstrated to the participants in the Congress are the art objects of the Royal Palace, the National Museum, the State Historical Museum, the Northern Museum and Skansen, the East Asiatic collections and others. A special display of the Cyprus excavations will be arranged. A number of interesting visits and excursions to places of historical interest or scenic beauty will be organized by the Swedish congress committee.
