ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

The Rev. W. W. Lodge will preach in the Clifton Church, Lot 48 next Sunday May 15th at 2.30 p. m. (D. V.)

The steamer Hillsboro leaves Charlottetown each morning about 6.30 in order that a trip may be made from Southport at 6.30 to bring over passengers who wish to connect with the Princess leaving at seven for Pictou.

It is not probable that Dr Doyle, Vernon River will be removed to the Hope River parish recently made vacant by the death of Rev Father Reid. Dr Doyle may however administer the diocese in the absence of Bishop McDonald who leaves shortly for Rome.

The City of London has engaged the marine ship, Pictou, for Thursday and Friday next to have her hull cleaned and painted below the water line. Her routes on West and East River respectively will be filled by the steamer Fred M. Batt from the wharf used by the City of London in this city.

THE S. S. City of London had upwards of 50 passengers from the Belfast district yesterday. Her cargo from Vernon River Bridge, Brush and Halliday's wharves consisted of 1,750 bushels potatoes, 125 cases eggs, 15 hogs and miscellaneous other consignments. The Steam Navigation wharf is like a veritable vegetable market.

The Plant agency has received a telegram from Boston stating the baggage declaration requirement has been done away with. For the past six months passengers from Halifax were required, the same as European passengers, to make a sworn declaration of the contents of their trunks, valises, etc. This will be no longer necessary, the baggage being simply examined in the old way by customs officials.

This season more than ever, by reason of the steady and extraordinary increase of tourist steamboat travel between Boston and the Maritime Provinces, the Eastern Steamship Company apparently is striving and is able to guarantee the best possible accommodations to its patrons. The summer schedule on this division provides for trips on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from St. John for Boston by the steamers "Calvin Austin" and "Penobscot," which will stop at all landings, including Portland, Eastport, Lubec and St. John.

EASTERN NOTES.—A week in May and no farming, with frost at night caused by ice floating in the Gulf to the north of us and some scattered cakes passing the East Point south. The intense cold of winter formed an unusual quantity of ice, which the westerly winds of a few weeks ago failed to clear out, and it is here now impeding navigation, diverting the ocean liners from the St. Lawrence to Halifax, and causing loss and inconvenience to the lobster fishermen along our north shore. At date of writing no traps are set off East Point for some distance down the north side; on the south side the factories are running and catches of lobsters fair. Herring have struck in abundance the last few days, and a few codfish are landed at West River, Basin Head and Red Point, but the fishermen have not all their trawls set yet.—Mrs. Ebenezer Jarvis arrived home from Boston on the 5th inst., where she had spent the winter.—Isalah Enman for many years a resident of Pownal, but for the last few years residing at St. Catherine's, died on the 3rd inst. and was buried at West River Church. He was in his 89th year.

THESE passed away on Tuesday, May 3rd, at Dundas, Catherine, wife of Malcolm Matheson in the seventy-second year of her age. She deceased was an invalid for twenty years and during the last fifteen years she was unable to stand even with the assistance of crutches. Yet her great affliction failed to dampen her cheerful spirit or to overtax her exemplary patience, but through it all she bowed in calm submission to the Divine Will and bore her sufferings without a murmur. She was a native of the Isle of Skye, Scotland, and was married to Mr. Matheson forty-nine years ago, since which time she resided in Dundas. She leaves besides her sorrowing husband four daughters and six sons. These are: Mrs. Daniel MacLean, St. Peter's; Mary, Sarah and Alice at home; Daniel, Samuel, John and Archibald in Dawson, Y. T.; Tenny in New York and George on the homestead. The funeral services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. M. N. MacLeod, who was assisted by Rev. Mr. MacNeill of Orwell. Her favourite hymn, "Rock of Ages" was by her own request sung at the close of the service, after which all that was mortal of one greatly beloved was borne to its last resting place, followed by a long procession of friends. The sorrowing family have the sympathy of their large circle of friends in their sore bereavement.

The malady under which he was suffering was but a passing indisposition and doctors and friends hope to have him soon again at his post. Father Burke said that the general sympathy expressed by so many in Montreal, spoke eloquently of his worth. Father Meahan's sister is with him at Hotel Dieu. Father Burke informed us that the plough was just put in the furrow about Montreal and the buds bursting on the trees. The weather was warm and a good spring seeding was expected. There was still snow to be seen in many places, however. Northern New Brunswick and western Prince Edward Island are much alike in this regard.—Moncton Times.
