22 Separate Fires

Twenty two separate fires were burning in New Brunswick, where the situation was reported to be the most serious since 1923. The conflagration reached major proportions in Restigouche County but fire-rangers, aided by an army of volunteer workers, hoped to soon bring it under control.

Quebec

The Quebec forestry service stated that other than in the Rouyn-Noranda district the situation was under control in that province despite the outbreak of many small fires. In the northern mining town of Rouyn, menaced Tuesday by a sweeping blaze, a fire which flared forth anew today held John Rudy, who was reported to have confessed to starting fires in the vicinity of the town. Police searched for an unknown, unnamed man of alleged communistic leanings as an accomplice.

Advance of the blaze which destroyed Valalain on Tuesday and threatened the villages of Joly and Henry River, on the St. Lawrence coast between Montreal and Quebec, had been checked tonight.

FIRE UNDER CONTROL

HALIFAX, May 18—Forest fires which wrought havoc in widely separated sections of Nova Scotia yesterday and the previous night were mainly under control today, according to officials of the lands and forests department.

A blaze was still burning fiercely near Kempton, in Colchester County, where a disused lumber camp owned by W. D. Hills was destroyed. Fire Ranger M. Woods expressed the belief the fire had been set deliberately, as it had broken out in three separate places.

country leads to "hatred, driving all to destruction." Atheism, he said, has spread through large masses of the people and worked its way "even into the common schools."

"It appears in the theatre," he added. "In order to spread itself it makes use of its own cinema films, of the gramophone and the radio. It has formed its own political parties and its own economic and military systems."

In connection with the economic crisis, he said: "The holy cross of the Lord, symbol of humility and poverty, is joined together with the symbols of modern imperialism—as though religion were alive with those dark powers which produce such evils. Thus they (agitators) strive, and not without effect, to combine war against God with men's struggle for their daily bread, with their desire to have land of their own, suitable wages and a decent dwelling, in fine, a condition of life befitting human beings."

This is the most dreadful evil of our times, for they destroy every bond of law, human or divine; they engage openly and in secret in a relentless struggle against God himself; they carry out the diabolical programme of wresting from the hearts of all, even from children, all religious sentiment; for well they know that when once belief in God has been taken from the heart of mankind they will be entirely free to work out their will.

"Thus we see today what was never before seen in history—the satanical banners of war against God and against religion brazenly unfurled to the winds in the midst of all peoples and in all parts of the earth."

TORONTO, May 18. (By the Canadian Press)—Increasing menace of forest fires in Canada was creeping westward early tonight, a spreading blaze threatens the village of Elma, Man., but meanwhile lack of wind and strict control of forest travel helped weary bands of fire fighters subdue blazes which dot New Brunswick and Quebec, in Ontario fires in both the north and south were under control after destroying wide expanses of timber and brush.

At Elma, small settlement near Winnipeg, more than 400 smoke-greased people armed with water buckets fought the flames. By early evening tongues of fire were within 400 yards of the village. While the men fought to save their property, women and children prepared to vacate if the blaze should take hold of the outer-most buildings.
