Japs Lost 600 Planes in August

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NORTHWEST PACIFIC, Aug. 31—(AP)—Japanese losses in the month in New Guinea and the Solomon Islands were brought to approximately 600 by the destruction of 59 Japanese fighters and 59 in action announced today in Gen. Douglas MacArthur's communiqué.

An 11-ton raid Sunday on Newak and other Japanese losses reported today included eight at the Kahiki airbase in the northern Solomons and one in Dutch New Guinea.

These latest air victories boosted the total in New Guinea during the month to at least 831 and in the Solomons to a minimum to 208. These figures do not include enemy planes listed as probably destroyed.

Telephone Pioneer Dies in Nova Scotia

HALIFAX, Aug. 31—(CP)—John James Young, 70 one of the pioneers of the telephone industry in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, died last night in hospital here. AN EAST COAST CANADIAN PORT, Aug. 31—(CP)—Deaths of 30 seamen as the aftermath of a collision between two killed merchantmen off the eastern seaboard were disclosed here today when the bodies were brought in aboard the flame-swept tanker on which they died.

The seamen died of burns and suffocation when the tanker caught fire after colliding with the other ship 300 miles off the Nova Scotia coast. Cause of the accident was not known here.

Besides the 30 killed, a number of members of the crew of the tanker suffered injuries in the fire. At least two were taken to hospital on reaching shore.

Time of the collision was not revealed.

Still smoldering, the tanker was towed in by tugs from Sydney, N. S., and Louisbourg, N. S. The bodies were landed at another East Coast Canadian Port and then brought to this port.

An inquest was to open tonight. Surviving members of the crew could not be reached at once for details of the tragedy.

First Dehydration Plant for Quebec

QUEBEC, Aug. 31—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced yesterday the early establishment of a dehydration plant for vegetables at LaPatrie, near Montreal. The plant, which will begin operations about the middle of September, will be the first of its kind in the Province, although eight others are already functioning elsewhere in Canada.

The owners of the new enterprise (La Societe Fordon Inc.) state they will concentrate on carrots, cabbages and turnips for the present.

17 of 27 Dead in Train Wreck Are Identified

WAYLAND, N. Y., Aug. 31—(AP)—Seventeen of the 27 persons who lost their lives in the wreck of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western's Lackawanna Limited were identified tonight.

Railroad and local officials continued trying to identify the others, many of whom were scalded beyond recognition in the crash of the passenger train, carrying 300 passengers on a New York-Buffalo run, with a switch engine near the Wayland station at 5:45 p.m., E.D.T. yesterday.

Fifty-six of the 50 injured were in hospital. The state public service commission and the interstate commerce commission launched an investigation into the accident, one of the worst catastrophes in American railroad history.

The railroad announced it would open its own inquiry tomorrow.

Officials at the Lackawanna office in New York said cause of the accident was known but "the reason for the local freight engine pulling out to foul the main track is not known."

The Lackawanna said the accident was its first involving fatalities since 1925. The death toll was the state's highest on a railroad since April 19, 1940, when the New York Central's Shore Line Limited crashed on a sharp curve at Little Falls, killing 31 and injuring 138.

Big Battle With Nazi Fighters Over Italy

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 31—(AP)—Angry swarms of reinforced German fighters opening the bitterest air battle over Italy—it swirled 100 miles out to sea—faded in a desolate attempt yesterday to halt medium Marauder bombers from raining tons of bombs on choked freight yards at Aversa, north of Naples.

Seventeen enemy attackers were shot down in this sternest opposition of the day. Allied heavy bombers meanwhile ripped up the airbase at Viterbo and spread ruin in the key railway junction of Civita Vecchia, both in the north of Rome.

In all, 31 Axis planes were destroyed in these and other raids on southern Italy. Fifteen German fighters were shot down. Allied headquarters announced today.

Plenty Underwear For This Winter

OTTAWA, Aug. 31—(CP)—Jack Frost, who has probably chortled over the Canadian coal shortage, will be glad to face with an ancient adversary—red flannel underwear.

The prices board, answering a hail of inquiries from folks worried about warm underwear for the coming winter, announced there will be enough of all kinds to go around.

This statement merged nicely with suggestion from the munitions department that Canadians this winter make four tons of coal do where five were needed before in heating their homes.

Official sources said Canadians could very well have lower temperatures in urban homes during the winter. If city residents in particular would put on more warm clothing the temperatures might be dropped as much as 10 degrees below what they are now, they said.

Tens of thousands of tons of coal would be saved as a result. While the supply of children's underwear for the buying rush which comes with the opening of school is less than usual, there will be ample supplies available during the fall, the board said.

Gen. Eisenhower Is Promoted

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31—(AP)—President Roosevelt today announced promotion of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander of the Allied forces in North Africa, to permanent rank of Major-General. Gen. Eisenhower holds the temporary rank of full General and the permanent rank of Colonel.

The President also announced award of a Distinguished Service Medal to Gen. Eisenhower in recognition of his leadership in the campaign in North Africa. In another announcement at his press conference, Mr. Roosevelt said Gen. George C. Marshall's appointment as Chief of Staff of the United States Army would continue indefinitely.

Gen. Marshall's four-year term expires today.

War Situation Last Night

With the Russians surging forward on all sectors, the most significant advance appears to be in the south, threatening as it does the German hold on the Crimea and smashing Nazi hopes of a drive into the Caucasus for Russia.

Coupled with the big American raid on the Ploesti oil fields in Rumania and aerial stabs from Britain at synthetic fuel plants in Germany, the outlook for German forces is a bleak one—harder and harder fighting to carry them into battle.

Thrown out of Tanagerog, the Nazis can be expected to try and anchor at Mariupol on the sea of Azov a new line running northwest to Dniepropetrovsk.

Such a line would offer few natural barriers to the Russians, however, and there is nothing to indicate the Germans are capable of holding it against the rolling red offensive.

If the Germans are pushed beyond Mariupol, their hold on the Crimean Peninsula and the positions still retained across the Kerch Strait around Novorossiisk, are threatened. They might well be pushed back to the Dnieper River, which would re-establish Russian control of the Crimea and the capture of Yelnya by the Russian forces begins to threaten Smolensk, anchor of the whole German line in that area.

Seizure of Yelnya also put the red army closer to the important Smolensk-Bryansk rail line. Cutting of the line would endanger German forces now resisting stoutly at Bryansk.

So powerful is the Russian advance along the entire line that it seems only bad weather can halt it. And this is a distinct possibility—the autumn rains will be hammered by mud—for six or seven weeks.

Such a situation would be a virtual disaster for the Germans, who until the ground freezes, this fall would give the Germans time to strengthen their lines, but by the same token it would present an opportunity for the Russians to consolidate their gains and mass their troops and supplies for a resumed offensive.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Churchill in his Quebec speech today dropped a broad hint that, despite the Russian successes and the repeated urging of Marshall Joseph Stalin for a second front in western Europe, Britain and the United States were not yet ready to launch an invasion across the English Channel.

"When the day for invasion comes, he said, 'you may be sure that I will be because we are satisfied that there is a good prospect of controlling the air during the night, the use of explosives was dropped, causing widespread damage.

Halifaxes and Lancasters of the Canadian Bomber Group participated in the assault and many of them said extremely heavy German fighter opposition was encountered. Gunners of one squadron destroyed at least two enemy fighters and a Canadian bomber in a R. A. P. striking down another.

Delayed - Action Defence

The Germans used a delayed-action gas defence in the Rhineland attack, the Air Ministry said. The Nazis held back until the first salvo of bombs had gone down, and then they turned on a heavy barrage.

Many combats followed as fighters attacked bombers silhouetted against the sky.

Large German Fighter Airport Heavily Bombed

LONDON, Sept. 1—(Wednesday)—(AP)—A large force of American heavy bombers battered the Axis fighter base at Amiens-Ghies in Canadian F. last night in their attack on enemy airfields and industrial targets on the last day of the fourth year of the war.
