Stock Drift Downward On New York Mart
 (Canadian Press)

NEW YORK, Feb. 28—Lack of interest rather than selling pressure resulted in a generally lower drift of leading stocks in today's market. The list slipped from the start and, at the worst, prices were off 1 to around 3 cents. There were mild recovery periods, however, and extreme losses were reduced in a number of instances near the close. Transfers amounted to 560,810 shares against 807,970 last Friday. The Associated Press average of 90 stocks was off .6 of a point at 45.5. The Canadian list tended lower. Bell Telephone dropped 2 points to 160 and International Nickel 1-8 to 50 3-8 as Distillers-Seagram, McIntyre, Brazilian and Ford listed slight losses. Ahead fractions were Dome, Lake Shore and Massey Harris.

Metals Lead Decline On Mt'l. Market

MONTREAL, Feb. 28—(CP)—The stock market dragged through a dreary month-end session today with the main list generally firmer, though some prices pointed as much as a point lower. Metals piloted the decline, slipping from the start. A number of lots were offered. Oils and papers were quiet at unchanged to slightly lower prices. Also trading on a small scale, constructions and rails backed up. Steel of Canada and National Steel Car held minor improvements but backsets showed for Canada Cement, Dominion Steel B. Canadian Car Preferred and C.P.R. Total sales: 83,000 shares; industrials, 15,700; mines 79,300; bonds \$4,000.

That Body of Hours
 A SLOW HEART RATE IS USUALLY A GOOD SIGN
 Just as individuals may become alarmed because of a fast heart rate, 80 to 84 instead of 72 to 76, so there are others that find the heart rate slower than normal, that is 60 to 66.
 Examining well trained boxers a few hours before their bouts we find that the heart rate may be as low as 56 to 60. Of course, in some cases this low heart rate is due to the fact that in trying to get down to the required weight at 2 o'clock of the day of the bout, they may have eaten no food since the midday meal of the previous day, or at least have eaten no breakfast or lunch on the day of the bout. But aside from this doing without food the well trained boxer has a slower heart rate than the average.
 What about a slow heart rate in those who are not boxers? Is a slow heart a good sign, or a bad sign? Dr. Philip W. Morgan, Emporia, tells in the Journal of the Kansas Medical Society of communicating with 25 American life insurance companies to determine the number of those with a slow heart rate in proportion to those with the normal rate and their life expectancy—how long they were likely to live—as compared with the normal rate.
 Dr. Morgan found that these life insurance companies accepted applicants with bradycardia (slow heart rate) and occasionally even with a marked bradycardia. In 700 young men with medical histories remarkably free from serious illness, heart rate with individual resting—of less than 60 were found in three percent and rates of 60 to 65 were found in 16 percent, making a total of nineteen percent with pulse rates of 66 or less.
 Dr. Morgan's observations show that a fair percentage of apparently normal healthy individuals have a slow heart rate and that they can expect, according to medical statistics, about an 18 to 19 percent better death rate than the average.
 Thus those with a slow heart rate who are otherwise healthy may now feel assured that a slow heart rate is an asset, not a liability, as it means that heart and blood vessels are doing their work in an efficient manner.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 28—(CP)—Wheat futures ended a dull and listless month of trading on Winnipeg grain exchange today with brokers expecting new orders for grain shipment after opening of St. Lawrence navigation to provide action in coming seasons. Wheat and stock movements declined more than a cent today and then snapped back on month-end vening up operations. July future led the closing rally but all futures closed lower for the day, 2-4-4 cent under Saturday's close. May 1-27 3-8, July 1-18 1-2 and Oct 97 cents.
 Cash wheat continued in a rut. No. 1 northern closed unchanged while No. 2 eased 1-2 cent to seven cents premium over the May future. Other trades also showed an easier trend.
 Course grains followed wheat, closing finishing 1-1-4 lower, barley 3-4-1 lower; flax 1-8-1 5-8 lower; and rye 1-0 3-8 cents below Saturday's final prices.
