Word has been received from Ottawa by the Summerside Town Council that a grant of \$1500 has been placed in the supplementary estimates to go towards defraying the cost of opening Summer Street to Water Street, together with an additional sum to build a concrete sidewalk from the post office to Water Street.

The Stanley Mack, a schooner of about 90 tons, Capt. White, bound to Dalhousie with coal, sprung a leak and was towed into Summerside harbor in a sinking condition by the Arbutus about one o'clock on Saturday morning. The captain says that she could not have been kept afloat for another hour. Her cargo is being discharged after which she will be repaired.

The Rev. J. L. Dawson, of Gower Street Church, St. John's, is in a critical condition says the St. John's Daily News of the 18th inst. and Sunday the prayers of the congregation were asked at the various Methodist churches. It is earnestly hoped that a change for the better may speedily take place. Rev. Mr. Dawson is a native of Tryon and was preparing to go to Sackville as announced in The Guardian last week.

MacKay conducted the service. Rev. William McDonald of Bloomfield offered prayer. Rev. A. D. McDonald of Hampton, who was also a former incumbent of Montrose, succeeded Rev. James Murray, delivered an interesting memorial address. He briefly sketched the life of the late pastor showing him to have been a man of ripe scholarship, a sincere gospel preacher, and a pastor beloved by his parishioners. Suitable music was furnished by the choir.

THE unexpected death of Mrs. Maud Clay, wife of Thomas E. Clay, Hartford Conn, on the 17th inst., at the early age of 20 will be sad news for the many friends in this Province. Mrs. Clay was a daughter of John and Mrs. McMurdo, Kensington, formerly of Alberton. Only a few months ago the spirit of her sister, Mrs. John Howard, Margate, passed to Him who gave it. Mrs. McMurdo, mother of the deceased was called to Hartford in January on account of the illness of her daughter from rheumatism. She apparently recovered, but on May 19 an infant son arrived in the home. Ten days later Mrs. Clay appeared to suffer from neuralgia, and although treated by three of the best physicians available, she passed away on June 19. Kind friends ministered to her wants, in addition to the help and love which only her mother could bestow, as well as the watchfulness of her husband, to whom she was so much attached. The remains accompanied by her husband and father were brought to Alberton, where the funeral took place on Saturday from the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Mr. Gratz officiating. Mrs. McMurdo was unable to return as she felt it her duty to remain behind to care for the little baby until the return of his father. Mrs. Clay was of an inestimable disposition, loving and kind, and wherever known was a general favorite. She has resided in Hartford for several years, her sister Ella, now Mrs. Ingalls, living not far distant. They were very much attached to each other, and as well as the many friends elsewhere, will rejoice in the good life of the departed, and her happiness, even in death.
