BOYS ENJOY TRIP OVER TO ENGLAND

The following letter has been received by Mr. Alexander Ross and family from their son Daniel, who is in the Siege Battery, England, dated Dec. 1st, 1915.

On board the S. S. Lapland. Dear Father, Mother and Sisters.—Well here we are in mid ocean, so I will start a letter and finish it when I get across. We left Halifax Sunday morning at 7 a. m. Came aboard Saturday at noon. From 11 a. m. Saturday until 5 there was a steady single file of troops boarding the ship, about 3000 strong. About 7 p. m. five or six tug-boats took the big ship out in the harbour and we anchored until Sunday morning. We had great weather until yesterday, had quite a little blow and the most of the boys are sick, am glad to say I wasn't and feel fine so far. Poor Harry is very bad, hasn't eaten anything since we started. This is quite a ship, over 600 feet long but large as she is the seas here will rock her like a row boat. We are passing the gulf-stream today, and it is quite warm. We do nothing but physical drill every morning, and only one-fourth of the men show up on account of seasickness. We will be in the danger zone by tomorrow night. This boat has been used as a transport for a long time, and was chased two or three times by a submarine but always got away.

Thursday.—We are in the danger zone and expect to meet an escort this afternoon. We got life-boat drill every day, divided into parties of 25 men. Each party has their own boat or raft. Have great concerts, services &c. aboard. The ship is supplied with three bands, bugle, brass and ships band. They are fitting up machine guns on deck today. Harry is better, had first meal today. By this time tomorrow we will sight the coast of Ireland.

Saturday morning.—Looks like business today, orders are for all hands to wear life belts. Most every one are in good spirits only a few worrying.

Well here we are at last. Landed at Plymouth early Sunday morn. Warm weather, mud to the ankles, and raining nearly all the time. Expect to be here two months. Got Bibles and regimental hymn-books in Halifax and have services every day. Get great receptions in the different towns we pass through. Am feeling fine, not the least seasick. Hope you are all well. With much love I remain

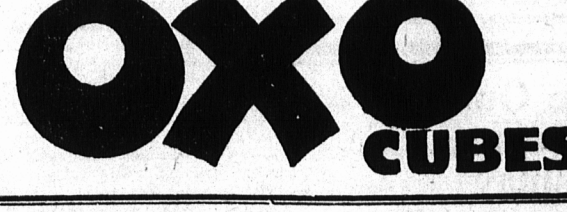

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 29.—A despatch received here from Budapest, says the Official Gazette has published a government order fixing the daily consumption of rye, wheat and barley flour at 240 grammes per head, for the general population, and at 300 grammes for persons engaged in hard physical labour.
