### PAIR FOUND ASPHYXIATED

MONCTON, N. B., April 2—A friendship formed more than four years ago when he was manager of the Campbellton branch of the Eastern Bakeries Ltd., and she was just out of business school, ended today for J. L. Roy, 36, of Moncton, and Miss Ethel Sanson, 28, of Campbellton, N. B., his stenographer.

Their bodies, clasped in each others arms, were found slumped in the rear seat of an automobile parked on the Moncton-Saint John highway a short distance from this city, this morning. They had died of carbon monoxide poisoning, coroner, Dr. R. J. Caldwell said.

Roy was transferred from Campbellton four years ago to become a manager of the branch in his native city. Miss Sanson came to Moncton about the same time and entered his employ.

A post mortem was held this afternoon but no announcement as to the findings would be made before the inquest Saturday, it was stated.

### Protective Tariff For Canadian Magazines Urged

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 2—A national resolution urging that a protective tariff be reinstated for Canadian magazines in the interests of patriotic ideals of the youth of Canada, and the livelihood of Canadian citizens, was endorsed by the provincial chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, before the end of the 36th annual convention here today.

### CANADIAN MOTOR CARS RUN WITH OIL FROM BIG BLACKFISH

HALIFAX, N.S., April 2—Cape Breton Island fishermen recently sighted a school of blackfish playing about off shore in the Atlantic. They went out in their boats, drove the fish toward the mud flats, and when the tide went out they were easy prey.

From the forty odd blackfish was secured 650 gallons of oil which they put to interesting uses. It was used to lubricate automobiles, it was burned in lamps in place of kerosene, it softened leather, and some of it went for use as a "body" for paint.

Blackfish sometimes measure more than twenty feet in length and weigh a ton and a half. They are not factors in commercial fishing, but occasionally fishermen take them when they get in difficulties in shallow water. Cape Breton has proved they may be put to various useful purposes.

By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 2.—In the last five years the Dominion Government has advanced \$3,717,222 to the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., according to a return tabled by Minister of Railways C. D. Howe in the House of Commons today. The amount was advanced in three lots, all of it to provide employment in the railway shops.

### Annual Meeting of Catholic Women's League

The annual meeting of the Catholic Women's League was held Wednesday evening in the Council Chamber of the Knights of Columbus Home with a large attendance. The President, Mrs. W. J. Sullivan, was in the chair. The annual reports from the convenors of the various committees were received and gave a detail of the work which stamped the year's activities as a very active and successful year. ### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Reverend Chaplain, Officers and Members of the Catholic Women's League:

In making this report of the work we have accomplished during the fourth year since organization of the Summerside Sub-Division, I feel that, despite these days of depression, our achievements, in the various charitable works, have been such that we can well be proud of them.

During the year we have held ten regular meetings, as well as an executive meeting before each one, and our attendance at these meetings has been steadily increased.

Despite the fact that the envelope collection this year was \$26.00 below that of the previous year, and that there were no special contributions as in former years, we conclude the year with a substantial surplus.

### War Veterans' Bills Studied

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 2.—The parliamentary committee on ex-service men's problems will continue hearing representations tomorrow from spokesmen of the veterans' organizations. Three bills are before the committee.

Most important of these is one incorporating proposed amendments to the Pension Act, designed to continue in office the Canadian Pension Commission, and making provision for administrative and other changes.

The second establishes a "veterans' assistance commission" to investigate possibilities for wider employment of ex-service men.

The third amends the War Veterans' Allowance Act, extending its provisions under certain conditions.

Today, the committee heard Brig. General Alex. Ross, Dominion President, J. R. Bowler, General Secretary, and Richard Hale, Chief Adjustment Officer of the Canadian Legion; Captain E. A. Baker, M.C. for the blinded sailors and soldiers, and Richard Myers, Hon. Secretary of the Amputations Associations.

### Plan Investigation Of Political Broadcasts

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, April 2.—While the Canadian Radio Commission endeavors to guard against violation of that section of the act directed against defamatory, libellous and disturbing broadcasts, no hard and fast rule of advance censorship is laid down, the Commons committee on radio was told today.

Station directors are permitted to use their judgment and discretion in demanding advance copies of radio addresses, Hector Charlesworth, commission chairman, told the committee. Reputation and standing of the customer influences the decision of the station official as to whether or not his radio address must be submitted in advance.

The "Mr. Sage" broadcasts which featured the general election campaign last fall and aroused considerable comment, were briefly touched upon today, and prospects were seen that these and other political broadcasts of the campaign would be thoroughly probed before the committee ends its hearings.
