FURTHER particulars regarding the injuries sustained by Thomas O'Grady at Kentville which called his daughter Miss O'Grady of Gauvin, Gentsel & Co. to his bedside are as follows: An unbound special train in charge of Conductor Nichols, struck Thomas O'Grady, completely everting one foot above the ankle.
