(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) KENTVILLE, N. S. Dec. 22—Lendell Schurman was remanded for one week when he appeared in court here today on a charge of manslaughter arising out of the death of Clarence Hughes in a highway accident near Kentville Sunday. Bail was set at \$4,000.

Schurman was the driver of a truck which crashed into a ditch while attempting to make a turn into another road. Hughes, a passenger, was killed instantly and Schurman and his wife were slightly injured.

A coroner's jury inquiring into the accident reported that the truck lacked proper brakes and steering gear and that the driver was under the influence of liquor.

Aged Sisters Claim Zaharoff Fortune

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Turkey, Dec. 22—Two aged sisters who live alone in a cozy villa in the Sea of Marmara laid claim today to the huge fortune of Sir Basil Zaharoff, the late "armaments king."

But not for themselves, they added quickly. The sisters, Iphigenie, 80, and Melpomeni, 70, want the money to go to the Greek and Turkish Governments.

The two elderly women asserted they possess documentary evidence that they are first cousins of Zaharoff and therefore entitled to a share of his vast estate. Their brother, Alexander Zaharopoulis, who had devoted many years to preparing the evidence, died at the age of 75 just a fortnight before Sir Basil died at Monte Carlo Nov. 27.

Santa Claus Keeps Up With The Times

MONCTON, Dec. 23—Santa Claus, though an ancient old chap, finds it necessary to keep pace with the times in order to fulfill his obligations to the vast multitude of his little folks and in so doing uses all means of modern inventions in transportation and communication to reach the many boys and girls which each year are being added to his calling list.

An idea which has been of great assistance to Santa Claus is the use of the telegraph in sending messages to his little friends: The two telegraph companies have this year made provision so that parents can arrange for Santa Claus to send messages a day or so before Christmas and in some case he parties which they may be holding about Christmas time. All that daddy or mother has to do is to get in touch with the nearest telegraph office and the matter will be attended to.

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Atlantic Gales Delay Shipping

NEW YORK, Dec. 22—(CP)—Two ships, with a Christmas quota of passengers, mail and freight, reached port today after being buffeted by Atlantic gales that reached 100 miles an hour.

They were the liner Koeningstein, two days late, and the Pilsudski, one day late. Wireless reports from ships still bucking mountainous seas were being received by steamship offices, indicating they will be one day to three days late.

The Rotterdam, due from Holland Wednesday, reported she would dock Christmas Day. The Monarch of Bermuda, due Wednesday morning, wireless she would not be in until evening. The John a dozen liners already reported delayed.

Captain John Mohlhand, docking the Koeningstein in Hoboken, said he had passed through six storms, with the wind veering from south to northwest with increasing intensity.

Vatican Protests Strongly To Reich

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BERLIN, Dec. 22—The Vatican has made formal representations to the German Foreign Office against an attack on German Catholic Bishops by Julius Streicher, Nazi leader of the Nuremberg district and publisher of the anti-Semitic weekly Der Sturmer, it was reported tonight.

In a recent speech at Cologne, Streicher attacked German Catholics as a whole and lodged personal accusations against the Catholic Bishops.

The speech was said to have aroused a storm of protest from the Catholic community. Karl Cardinal Schulte, Archbishop of Cologne, protested to Mgr. Cesare Orsenigo, Papal Nunco at Berlin, who in turn made the representations to the Wilhelmstrasse during a lengthy conference with foreign minister Konstantin von Neurath a few days ago.

Island Gifts Make Brighter Alta. Christmas

DRUMHELLER, Alta., Dec. 22—The citizens of far off Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, have made the Christmas season much brighter for hundreds of needy families in the Drumheller district. Perhaps the largest Christmas hamper ever to be received here arrived over the weekend when a special carload of vegetables rolled into the C. N. R. station. The vegetables were a gift from a joint committee of churches in Charlottetown and vicinity.

The heated car supplied free of charge by the Canadian National Railways contained 430 sacks of potatoes, turnips, carrots, beets and cabbage. In addition to this there were 15 cases of canned goods to be distributed.

The much-needed food is being distributed by the Drumheller Welfare Board as quickly as possible to the needy cases in Drumheller district. The gift is proving beneficial to the many hauled-out farmers in this area. Among the areas in which the vegetables are being distributed are municipal districts of Michichi, Churchill school district, Rainbow school district, East Marne and West Marne, Dorothy and Indian Springs school district.

The vegetables were handled in Charlottetown by J. Lester Douglas, chairman of relief committee there. In Drumheller Mrs. J. P. Meagher is handling the distribution. The Black and White garage of this city has donated a truck to be used for distribution of goods here.

Gordon Taylor of the Churchill Social Credit Group has suggested that some of the vegetables be used to make soup for needy children attending school in Churchill, Marne and Rainbow school districts. It is understood that action is being taken on his suggestion.
