Articles Found In The Tomb Safeguarded

LUXOR, Egypt, March 12.—Extraordinary tranquility reigned for the moment at Luxor. The weather is very lovely, but there is an almost complete absence of the crowds of tourists, and since broods in the Valley of the Kings. The members of Lord Carnarvon's staff, who are now on holiday, return about the middle of next week, and though the tomb of Tutankhamen itself will remain closed until autumn, activity will be resumed in the workshop in the preparation and preparations of articles for packing.

One remarkable thing about the recent discovery by Lord Carnarvon and Howard Carter and their hand-picking of the whole affair is that, so far as it is known, not a single object has yet appeared on the market purporting to come from Tutankhamen's tomb. For a find of this size this is most unusual.

Since the days of the early tomb robbers, a large part of the population of Egypt has derived a considerable portion of its revenue from the plunder of ancient monuments. The business of stealing and smuggling smaller objects has been most scientifically developed, and generally no sooner is a large find known to have occurred, than articles said to have come from it begin to leak into the market and are offered more or less clandestinely for sale.

So universal is the practice that, at an inexperienced excavator, not knowing how to control his workmen, is likely to get most meagre results himself from his first finds. There is the notorious case of a distinguished excavator who happened not to be present at the moment of the discovery of a royal mummy and when he arrived not a single jewel or article of value was to be seen nor was ever discovered, to the great subsequent regret of all Egyptologists. In another case, an excavator put the objects found for a single day in an adjoining native house under a guard, but everything disappeared during the night.

Still better known was the great find of a cache of statues and statuettes, several hundred of which were officially reported and reached the authorities, but how many hundreds more were sold to private buyers through secret channels was never known. In one famous case, a single article was sold by the thief to a local dealer for thirty shillings. It changed hands six times during the next five weeks, the final purchases paying £1,500.

At the present moment other excavations are going on in Egypt, those of Lord Carnarvon and Mr. Carter, and in Luxor and Cairo. There is quite an active traffic, secret but notorious, in minor articles said to have come from them.

Of course this opens the door to fraud. Many articles so sold have never come from the alleged source.

The absence of the manufacture of imitation antiquities has not lagged behind the science of faking, and as soon as it is reported that articles are leaking out of any particular find, the markets are flooded with fakes. But so far as is known, not even a single fake has yet been reported to have come from the tomb of Tutankhamen. It is true that the circumstances of the find made the safeguarding easier than it usually is, because the whole treasure was revealed on opening the first door of the ante-chamber, but this does not detract from the credit due to Howard Carter.

An inexperienced excavator would have lost things, anyhow, and it is only another illustration of the extreme care and skill with which everything has been done here.

None can say what strange tropicisms the tourists may disclose triumphantly on their return home, but it can absolutely be relied on that any such a trophy is false.

CHICKENS UNAFFECTED BY MILK PRESERVATIVE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, March 12.—Chickens thrive on milk preserved with formaldehyde, according to Professors A. M. Bielle and R. J. Seymour of Ohio State University, who have carried on a series of experiments in which growing chicks were fed milk to which this chemical had been added in amounts such as have been used for preservative purposes. The experiments were made in connection with the effect on the chicks of a diet containing certain vitamins. Those which were fed formaldehyde milk apparently grew as fast as the others.

"OLD" CLOTHES THAT COST MORE THAN NEW

When a person sees a "star" on the silver screen dressed in an evening gown composed almost entirely of pearls on a foreground of costly satin, one can easily understand that the actress's wardrobe bill reached into four or five figures.

Yet even in "rags and tatters" film with no sumptuous banquet scene or elaborate costuming, the wardrobe bill may tot up easily in tens of thousands.

The classic instance of this expensive implicity is the Jackie Coogan version of "Oliver Twist." Although most of the players in this picture are garbed in modest clothes, of humble folks the costume bill ran into many thousands of dollars.

In the early scenes of the story, at the workhouse and at the novel in Field Lane which constituted the headquarters of the "Fagin-Bill" gang of pickpockets, most of the players are dressed in rags, which are some of the most expensive costumes in the production.

Each tattered garment had to be specially made and had to be exactly modelled to the fashion of the decade period, and to the style of the best suited to the player. Then the raggedness had to be introduced into the finished articles in all, each garment took about three times as long to prepare as did the more civilized clothes of other scenes.

As a contrast to his expensive rags in "Oliver Twist," Jackie wore a tattered outfit for his role in "My Boy" which cost him nothing at all. These garments—Coogan's at all these cherished possessions, by the way—were given to the tiny "star" by Charlie Chaplin, who introduced him to the screen.

that during his recent visit to Great Britain he found commission dealers, prominent citizens and consumers generally, attracted by a wonderfully warm feeling towards Canada, her people and her products. On top of this comes a message direct from London that leading importers of Danish bacon have not fled the country since that the Danish bacon reaching Britain at the present time is much too fat, while the Canadian bacon that reaches London is of good quality. The message adds that Canadian press representatives overseas have been informed that Denmark is in danger of losing her favourable position in the trade unless change for the better is effected. Formerly there was a wide margin between prices paid for Danish and Canadian bacon, but recent advice received by the Live Stock Branch at Ottawa indicate that there has been quite a levelling up that in fact the price paid for Canadian lean bacon per long hundredweight is but a few shillings less than that paid for the best Danish.

MAYFLOWER WILL BE ALTERED

GLoucester, Mass., March 10.—The Mayflower, smartest schooner of the United States fisheries under sail, is to be cut down and equipped with a motor. Sporting considerations have been set aside by the Boston syndicate that owns her and "they" have written off a loss of \$14,000 incurred in the two years' effort to have the Mayflower recognized as a fisherman eligible to compete for the Halifax Herald Championship Cup. The speed built into the schooner from the designs of Starling Burgess which caused her to be declared to be more nearly a yacht than a fisherman, will never be tested as planned, although she may be raced in her revised form, with the engine sealed.

CANADIAN BACON INCREASES IN FAVOR

We have the assurance of the Deputy Minister of Agriculture of the Dominion, Dr. J. H. Grisdale,

A racing suit of sails may be spared the sailcutters' knife, for the present, as the Mayflower will wear out her oldest sail, also curtailed when she takes up the off shore fisheries with a "checker" for power some time next month. Several factors contributed to the vote of the Mayflower Associates to alter the schooner that was their pride. The sport they had sought in building her was denied. She had cost them \$14,000 because of the last looking races and expenses in equipped her to race although it is asserted that the Mayflower paid her way and left a tidy profit, for the time actually spent in the fisheries. The crew, keen for sport, became disgruntled when that was denied them, and went on strike after the Mayflower returned to Boston last fall, objecting to the loss of pay while they unsuccessfully sought races and the failure to have a motor installed. As the Mayflower could not race, the owners decided she would fish with full equipment and the order for a motor followed. At the same time they marked off the loss of \$14,600 by reducing the par value of their shares.

Under her new conditions, the Mayflower's owners expect she will stock enough fish and be able to run to market and back in all weather, fast enough to make her high priced line of the Boston-Gloucester fishing fleet. The Mayflower may still race under sail, although she will never be exactly as planned after the motor is installed. Ballast will be removed to make up for the weight of the engine. Her top sticks will be shortened, the main mast nine feet, and the spars proportionately. They may be lengthened to the proportions of her design, but only with considerable time and expense. It is probable that if the Mayflower enters for racing it will be with stubby masts and shorter spars, and with a spread of sail so much smaller; that she will have sacrificed much of her speed in light airs, although in better trim to stand a
