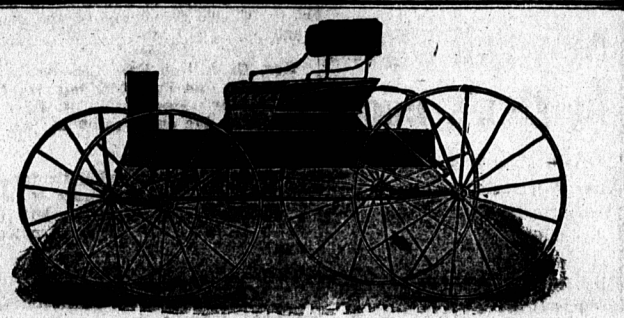

FISHING DULL. LOUISBURG, July 31—All branches of fishing have been reported very dull during the past month. On days when bait was procurable fair catches of cod were made, showing that these fish were over on the ground. Dog Fish continued on the coast throughout the month, hampering the net fishermen considerably, and doing great damage to the nets set in the month of July. The lobster season, which closed today, can be reported as an average one. During the early part of the season lobsters were fairly plentiful, but the catches dropped off considerably during the latter part of the season. Prices were not quite so high along this coast as last year, which was the banner year for prices on all kinds of fish, but especially have the prices of fish dropped in the local markets.

CHURCHILL DRINKING. BRISTOL'S MAYOR. LONDON, August 1.—While it is practically certain that the British prime minister will not visit Canada, Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, according to The Daily Telegraph, is considering an invitation and is likely to go to Canada in the autumn. No formal invitation has yet been issued, but it is said that if the Canadian Premier, Mr. Borden, is assured that the proposal will be viewed favorably, an official invitation will be extended to the British ministers willing to go to Canada. The Telegraph repeats the report that James Bryce, the British ambassador to the United States, will not return to Washington. Mr. Bryce is now traveling in Australia. The Telegraph says that the question as to Mr. Bryce's retention of his post will be asked in parliament today. QUEBEC, July 31.—Sir Frank Willis, lord Mayor of Bristol, arrived by the Royal Edward this afternoon. With him was Lady Willis and Miss Willis. His worship is a member of the delegation to attend the Cabot celebration in Nova Scotia. He is a typical Briton, and head of the great tobacco firm which bears his name. He is on his first visit to Canada and he evidently has greatly enjoyed his trip so far. Sir Frank spoke enthusiastically of the scenery along the St. Lawrence. His worship drew attention to the closeness of trade relations which had existed between the port of Bristol and Canada since Cabot first sailed to this country. He proceeded to Montreal on the steamer, Sir William Davies and Henry Risley are the other members of the delegation.
