**Police Active in Arresting Suspicious Persons—Exile Popular Punishment.**

LISBON, Jan. 31.—The political situation here shows no sign of improvement and the tension between the contesting parties is growing greater. Doubt is now expressed as to whether or not Premier Franco will be able to triumph over his Republic and monarchist enemies who have combined search actively for the police continue to search actively for new plots and conspirators. Sir: Permit me through the columns of your valuable paper to call the attention of all the people of Prince Edward Island to the immense amount of money sent away every year to mail order houses for goods that almost every merchant handles. I would ask any right thinking person, if it is fair to ask their dealer to charge groceries to them, (articles on which there is very little profit) and which will eventually be paid for in produce of some kind, and then send their ready money away to some mail order house abroad for goods on which there is a greater margin of profit.

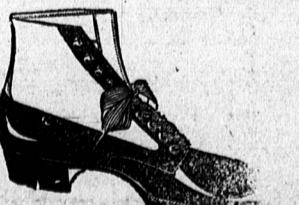
Do the people of P.E. Island realize what they are doing? Do they realize what the end must be if they continue to sap the very life blood of the country in this way? I think not, or if they do then I say that the very little patriotism in us should take for instance a merchant dealing in business in this Province paying all legitimate taxes, giving employment to a number of people in his vicinity paying out more money for every hour's labor done for him, and ever ready to subscribe to any worthy object, is he not more entitled to the trade of the people of the surrounding country than any house doing business in an Upper Canadian City, which neither directly nor indirectly contributes a cent to the revenue of our Province. Is it fair, I ask, to send money away for goods, that can be bought just as well from your own dealer, with the privilege of exchanging or getting your money back if the goods do not suit? I should say not. When there is a bad season with a poor crop, can any person go to a mail order house and get credit to tide him over until next year? No! It is cash, and cash only that they want, and the said person must go to some long suffering, but good-hearted merchant, who is ever ready to help him through, then, I say that he is under a certain obligation to give that merchant a chance to cater to his wants, when he send it away to pay some high salaried clerk abroad. If the Mail Order houses were assisting our people in any way, it would be different, but although, not under any obligation to them whatever, they are giving them a large proportion of their trade. It is greatly to be regretted that such a deplorable condition of things should exist, but it is only too true, and how can we remedy it? In my opinion the only way is to foster a spirit of true patriotism in our young people and have ourselves together, to work only for the best interests of our Province, then with young and old, having this object in view, the rest is easy. ### REVENGEFUL CONVICT'S ACT

**Convict, Released Attacks Philadelphia Youth Who Captured Him.**

BETHLEHEM, Pa., Jan. 31.—Clarance Schertz, a Philadelphia student at Lehigh University, lies in a critical condition at his lodgings from a beating by a man he had sent to prison for burglary. Eleven months ago young Schertz, then in his freshmen year, caught a robber at work in a grocery store here and, with a fellow student, captured him. The prisoner assured the boy at the time he was sentenced, that he would get even. He was released from the Eastern Penitentiary a month ago.

Last Saturday Schertz was set upon by the convict in South Bethlehem. The convict choked the lad face and head with brass knuckles. Schertz has half a dozen scalp wounds and it is feared the skull is injured. His mother, Mrs. E. C. Schertz, wife of a former shoe merchant of Philadelphia, is with him.

### HARNESS HORSES IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The annual midwinter sale of light harness horses by the Fasig-Lipton Company, began yesterday in Madison Square Garden and will last four days. A big crowd was in attendance in spite of the fact that the stock that came for the opening day was below the average. Prices ruled well and there was no lack of buyers. Horses were present from all parts of the country, while Canada, England and Australia were represented by agents looking for bargains. The stock offered brought an average of about \$200 and some went as high as \$1,000.

QUEBEC, Jan. 31.—In full view of perhaps a dozen spectators a ten-year-old boy named Ernest Larose was attacked and fearfully lacerated by a huge mastiff at the Palais in this city.

The boy, lay bleeding from several serious wounds, his hands having been completely bitten off, was removed to the hospital, where the physicians set to work on him. 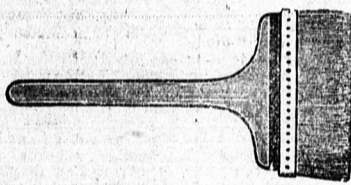
