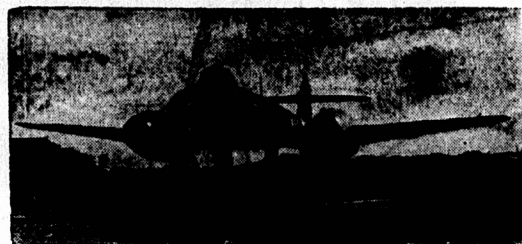

Notes From London

LONDON, England—A human tornado has just descended on London in the shape of Danny Kaye. He is in England to play a month's season at the London Palladium, following in the wake of other famous Hollywood personalities such as Mickey Rooney, Lena Horne, The Ink Spots, Laurel and Hardy, all of whom have been over here playing to packed houses in recent months. Mae West is also currently starring in her own play—"Diamond Lil". The huge tax which the Government has levied on the import of American films only seems to have resulted in a large part of Hollywood coming over in person!

Loretta Young was here, too, a little while ago, and though she never did a show she has since managed to get her name in the headlines as much as any of those who did, if not more so. This is as a result of what she is reported as having been saying in the U. S. about what she saw in England. She told, for instance, about a business executive she came across who had the soles of his shoes patched up with cardboard; about factory workers fainting for lack of food, and a newspaper reporter who wore a beard because he couldn't get a razor blade. Not to mention a girl who was so unused to chocolate that she didn't know how to eat it—whether to bite it or lick it.

Well, we may be having a fairly thin time, but we really don't think we are as badly off as all that. We have pretty well got used to some member of the Government telling us about once a week that we shall have to tighten our belts still more before things get better, but at least most of us still have a belt, even if it is an old one.

Most of us are charitable enough to Miss Young to take her comments lightly, and assume that she was misquoted, or didn't really mean it, or was kidding, or something. Or perhaps she was only trying to arouse some sympathy for us amongst the American population, for we have a friend of ours.

All the same, there is one person who seems to have taken the matter to heart. He is the chairman of the British Tourist and Holidays Board, the leader of Britain's drive to attract dollar-bringing tourists. He thinks that Loretta's words might keep potential visitors away because they might be scared to come to a land full of bearded savages, where they may even be chain-ganged into a factory and made to work without anything to eat.

One newspaper made the whole matter the subject of a leading article, and suggested slyly that it might have the opposite effect, and that people from all over the civilized world might come flocking to England to see the country of strange folk who wore cardboard on their feet and whiskers on their faces.

That newspaper just about reflected the general reaction, and the whole thing seems to have turned out to be just something to be treated lightly, of passing interest, and perhaps a little relief from the normal run of things. The chairman of the Tourist Board said that he was going to make a close investigation of Loretta's claims. By the time he has completed his report, if he bothers, probably everybody else will have forgotten all about it, and wonder what on earth he is talking about.

Cardboard soles or not, we still have cases of pride coming before comfort, and the lady's privilege not to confess her age is exercised even at 74!
