ZEALOUS CENSORS GIVE MOVIE POSTERS STARTLING EFFECTS

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 11.—Censorship of theatre posters in Montreal is conducted in a direct and primitive manner which results in startling displays at the entrance of the cheaper motion picture houses.

If one object in a pictorial poster contravenes the censorship regulations, the entire sheet need not necessarily be discarded. The offending portion may be painted out, and the picture, thus mutilated exposed to the unanalyzing eyes of the populace.

Thus a person strolling along St. Lawrence Boulevard may be confronted with a dramatic portrayal of a highly infuriated villain pointing a dab of green paint at an obviously horrified lady. Any amateur Sherlock can deduce that the gentleman is supposed to be pointing a revolver. Revolvers are not allowed in the proximity of ladies in Montreal, so in order to pacify the censors, the manager of the theatre had painted out the weapon.

Frequently the costumes of the "movie" heroines, as portrayed in the posters shock the sensibilities of the guardians of public morals. When this occurs the hardworked painter is again called into service and gowns are suitably lengthened and brightened—with little regard to color harmonization or the edicts of feminine fashion.

A display sheet in front of one of the picture palaces on "the Main" which recently puzzled many passers-by depicted a gay party in a cabaret. Several of the dresses had been amplified with more prodigality than artistry, but the figure which provoked greatest astonishment was a young buck in evening attire who extended a handless arm

Notorious Criminal Captured

(By British United Press.)

COLOGNE, August 12.—A private detective has laid his hands on one of the most daring and impudent of post-war international criminals, who is "wanted" in many European countries and on whose head, if captured in Germany, a big price was set. His name is Ludwig Oertel, alias von Egloustein, with many other high-sounding names used as occasion required, and his picture, with details of some of the crimes for which he will now be brought to book, and the offer of an ever-increasing reward, has been constantly thrown on the screen at every cinema in Germany for months past.

The private detective saw him in a restaurant in the suburbs of Cologne, and, not wishing to make a scene, told him to take two pacifiers to the nearest police station, the detective, of course, holding no warrant for the man's arrest. For answer Oertel struck him on the head with a water bottle and bolted. The detective, although partially stunned, dashed out and saw him board a passing tram-car. He gave chase in a commandeered car, and when his man alighted a desperate struggle occurred, but ultimately the police arrived and the criminal was secured—in a very damaged condition.

He admitted that he had been lying low in Berlin playing a trade as a hawker; then recently he had established a "lat" on the Dutch frontier in order to be able to slip over the border quite easily at the first alarm, and that he had been lulled into a sense of false security and had ventured into Cologne. He had not been in the city an hour before he was recognized by the smart private detective.

During the war Oertel pursued his criminal career on a large scale. At one time he posed as a delegate of the American Red Cross Society in Rumania, and actually stole a number of trains loaded with foodstuffs, clothing, and medical stores. His chief exploits since the war have been thefts of State documents from the Moabit Prison, Berlin, and from other Government offices. In 1925 he was arrested, and tried to commit suicide in court by taking poison. He was convicted and removed to the prison infirmary, whence he made his escape, and had succeeded in keeping at liberty till now. Many other big crimes are debited to his account.

OIL IN AUSTRALIA?

(By British United Press.)

SYDNEY, N.S.W. August.—Australia is the Cinderella of the continents as far as petroleum supplies are concerned. Despite extensive search not a single commercial well has been bored, though innumerable attempts have been made where geological and other considerations seemed favorable. Prospecting is still in progress and the recent appointment of Dr. Walter G. Woolnough (geological professor at Sydney University, as adviser to the Commonwealth Government, has given a fillip to the hunt for oil. Dr. Woolnough will submit a report on prospects of finding oil in Australia, and afterwards proceed to Papua and New Guinea, Australia's southern dependencies, to make a further search in conjunction with three British experts.

Of purely Australian prospects for locating petroleum, he bores now being sunk at Belford Dome, near Newcastle, New South Wales, Fitzroy River district, Western Australia, and Roma, Queensland, are considered to have the best chances of success. These three boring plants are among those which will share in the Government's offer to subsidize boring costs up to an aggregate of 100,000 pounds. It will be Dr. Woolnough's task to select other propositions to share in the grant.

Geologically, the oil belt of the world is supposed to miss Australia, but to include portions of Papua and the mandated territory of New Guinea.

Premier Ferguson Not Looking For Leadership

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.—Neither the Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Prime Minister of Ontario, nor Sir Thomas White, former Federal Finance Minister, have any leanings toward the leadership of the Conservative party which will be decided at the Winnipeg Convention this fall, according to Hon. George S. Henry, Minister of Roads in the Ontario Government, who is here enroute to eastern Quebec and the Maritime Provinces on a vacation trip. Hon. Mr. Henry's opinion was given in the course of an interview. "No doubt Mr. Ferguson has many friends in Ontario who want him to become Federal Conservative leader, not because they want to get rid of him in his present position, but that they want to make use of him in the larger field." Ford Takes First Aeroplane Ride

(Canadian Press.)

DETROIT, Aug. 11.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh shattered another record today, when he persuaded Henry Ford to take his first aeroplane ride. Accepting the transatlantic flier's invitation to ride with him Mr. Ford climbed into the famous plane "Spirit of St. Louis," which had been equipped with an extra seat in the cabin, and with Lindbergh at the controls cruised above the Ford airport for more than ten minutes.


Immediately thereafter Edsel Ford was taken up for a similar flight. It also was the younger Ford's first flight.

New Empire Exhibition

(By British United Press.)

SYDNEY, N. S. W. August 12.—A dominions exhibition, primarily advertising Australia, but on the lines of the Empire exhibition at Wembley in 1925, is to be held at Sydney, probably in 1931, under the auspices of the Commonwealth Government and by arrangement with the New South Wales Government. Sydney has been chosen as the site because in 1931 the 35,000,000 dollar bridge across Sydney Harbor will be completed, as well as the metropolitan system of underground railways.

The plans are the direct outcome of discussion at the Imperial Conference in London last year.

FAMILY WITH TAILS

(By British United Press.)

SYDNEY, N.S.W. August.—In this city there lives a family with tails! The father, a son 10 years of age, and two daughters, aged three and six, have appendages which are exciting the curiosity of Australian medical circles. Apart from their tails, the members of this remarkable family are perfectly normal. Doctors have suggested that they should have the appendages removed, but they prefer to keep them.

The father is 40 years of age. He was born with his tail. As an infant, the appendage was about two inches long. His father was perfectly normal, but his history records that, away back in the dim, distant past, a paternal relation was possessed of that incidental, the absence of which, with some anthropologists the world over, has an important bearing upon man's relation to some lower animal.

As the boy grew, the tail grew also. In his youth it was three inches long—a soft, limp affair, slightly furred with hair of a similar color to that on his head. It curled up directly at the base of the spinal column. When he reached manhood the tail was five inches long. And it has not grown since, although now it is almost covered with hair. As he grew to maturity, too, his control over his tail grew also, until at full manhood he could wag it, just as any dog can!

When the man's first child, a boy, was born ten years ago, he bore the same freakish characteristic of his father. Then four years later, the second child came along—a girl. She also had a tail. Three years after that another girl was born. She inherited the same amazing peculiarity. The children's tails today are four inches long. They are sparsely covered with hair, but the children have as yet no control over their movement. They merely hang limply from the base of the spine.

Sensitiveness and the knowledge that they were suffering no ill effect from what other people would term an affliction, restrained the father from seeking surgical advice. Doctors attending the family for common illnesses learned in course of time, but kept it closely-guarded until recently a newspaper reporter learned of the facts, and produced proof such as prompted his paper, the Sunday Journal, to vouch for the truth and authenticity of the case.

A Sydney medical specialist, discussing the family's trait with a representative of this newspaper, stated that he had known men and women to be possessed of an extra spinal joint, but he could recall no case of people having such well-defined tails as the family in question. "It is a sure case of atavism," he declared. "The tailed father and the children who inherit the appendage are undoubtedly throwbacks. It is inheritable heredity. It is all hark-back to a more or less remote ancestor, due to the reassertion of reawakening of ancestral contributions which have lain for several generations latent or unexpressed. There is no doubt that this family possessing perfect tail appendages is anthropologically very important. They are noteworthy links in the chain of man's evolution."
