MRS. MARY F. PHILLIPS

AMHERST, Feb. 22—Ex-Mayor H. W. Rogers has received word of the death of his sister, Mrs. Mary F. Phillips, in Fall River, Mass., after a lengthy illness. She was the widow of Charles A. Phillips and had resided in Fall River for many years. Mrs. Phillips was a musician of exceptional talent, and besides being a member of the Fall River Music Club was actively connected with the First Baptist Church and the W. C. T. U. Besides her brother in Amherst, there is a sister in Amherst, Mrs. C. W. Main, and three other sisters, Mrs. H. E. Easton and Mrs. W. B. Evans, of Toronto, and Mrs. Frederick L. Rogers, of Alberton. P. E. I. The late Justice T. S. Rogers, of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia was also a brother.

MR. WILLIAM A. MACNEILL

In the early evening hours of Tuesday, January 26th, Mr. William A. MacNeill, a very highly esteemed resident of Hunter River passed peacefully away at the age of eighty-six years. The deceased had been in his usual condition of good health and during the day had been doing the work about the house. In the early evening just after having attended to the fire in the stove he lay down on the sofa. Not long after he had done so, Mrs. MacNeill who was sitting not far away reading, heard Mr. MacNeill give a couple of short gasps. When she reached his side she was shocked to find that evidently he had suddenly passed

away. Medical aid was immediately summoned. When Dr. Murchison arrived he assured Mrs. MacNeill that all hope of recovery was gone. Life had become extinct. His gentle spirit had winged its heavenward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow, formerly Miss Elizabeth Donald, Park Corner, Mr. MacNeill leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father, two sons and two daughters. The sons are Townsend MacNeill, North Rustico and Alvah MacNeill, Cavendish, and the daughters are Mrs. Wilfrid Campbell, Park Corner, and Mrs. Frank Ramsay, Clifton. All are feeling keenly their loss. The deceased was one of a family of nine members—two brothers and seven sisters—The brothers were Charles MacNeill, Cavendish and Wm. A. MacNeill, Hunter River, now deceased, and the sisters were, Mrs. Jeremiah MacNeill and Mrs. Benjamin McLeod, Crapaud, Mrs. John Buntain and Mrs. James Craswell, South Rustico, Mrs. Wm. Donald, Park Corner, Mrs. Wm. McKay, Clifton and Mrs. Daniel McKay, French River. Of these only Mrs. Daniel McKay now remains.

Mr. MacNeill was born in Cavendish. He was the younger son of Alexander MacNeill and Helen Townsend MacNeill. He lived there until twelve years ago, when he and Mrs. MacNeill moved to Hunter River. He was a man who was well and favorably known throughout the whole countryside. Of a quiet retiring nature he never sought publicity of any kind. Hence it was that only those who came to know him well were able to appreciate his true worth. He was of a literary turn of mind and was in his own way somewhat of a poet. One of the great joys of his

life was to recite his poetry to his friends. Very few of these productions were ever written down. He took a deep interest in all that pertained to the welfare of the community and was never found wanting in helping on in every good cause. He was a loyal member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and during the days of its disruption he remained true to the faith of his fathers. Six years ago he was ordained to the Eldership of the Presbyterian Church at Hunter River, which office he has since filled with grace and dignity. He will be much missed in the different spheres and activities of life. But while this is so, it is in the home that his loss will be felt most deeply. His loved ones will often long for his genial presence and his word of good cheer. But they shall long in vain. No more can he draw near to bring to them comfort and joy. Not again shall they see him upon the earth. He has gone on into that home of many mansions where, because of his having been faithful unto the end he has already received the "well done" of the Master.

The funeral was held on the afternoon of Thursday, January 28th. There were two separate services. One service was held at the old home in Hunter River and was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert and the other service was held in the United Church, Cavendish and was conducted by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert and Rev. H. S. Bishop. Although the day was very stormy quite a large number were present at both services to pay their last respects to the deceased and to show the high esteem in which he was held by them.

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**St. Huberts Airport  
To Be Closed**

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 22—(By The Canadian Press)—Economy measures instituted by the Dominion government will mean almost complete closing down of activities at the St. Hubert Airport, near here, it was shown on Saturday when all but about six of the personnel received official notification from Ottawa that their services would not be required after March 31, 1932. A storekeeper and customs officer and several maintenance employees will be kept on, it was stated. The airport manager, four meteorological bureau officials, several air engineers and the office staff received notifications.
