MRS. WILLIAM MACPHAIL

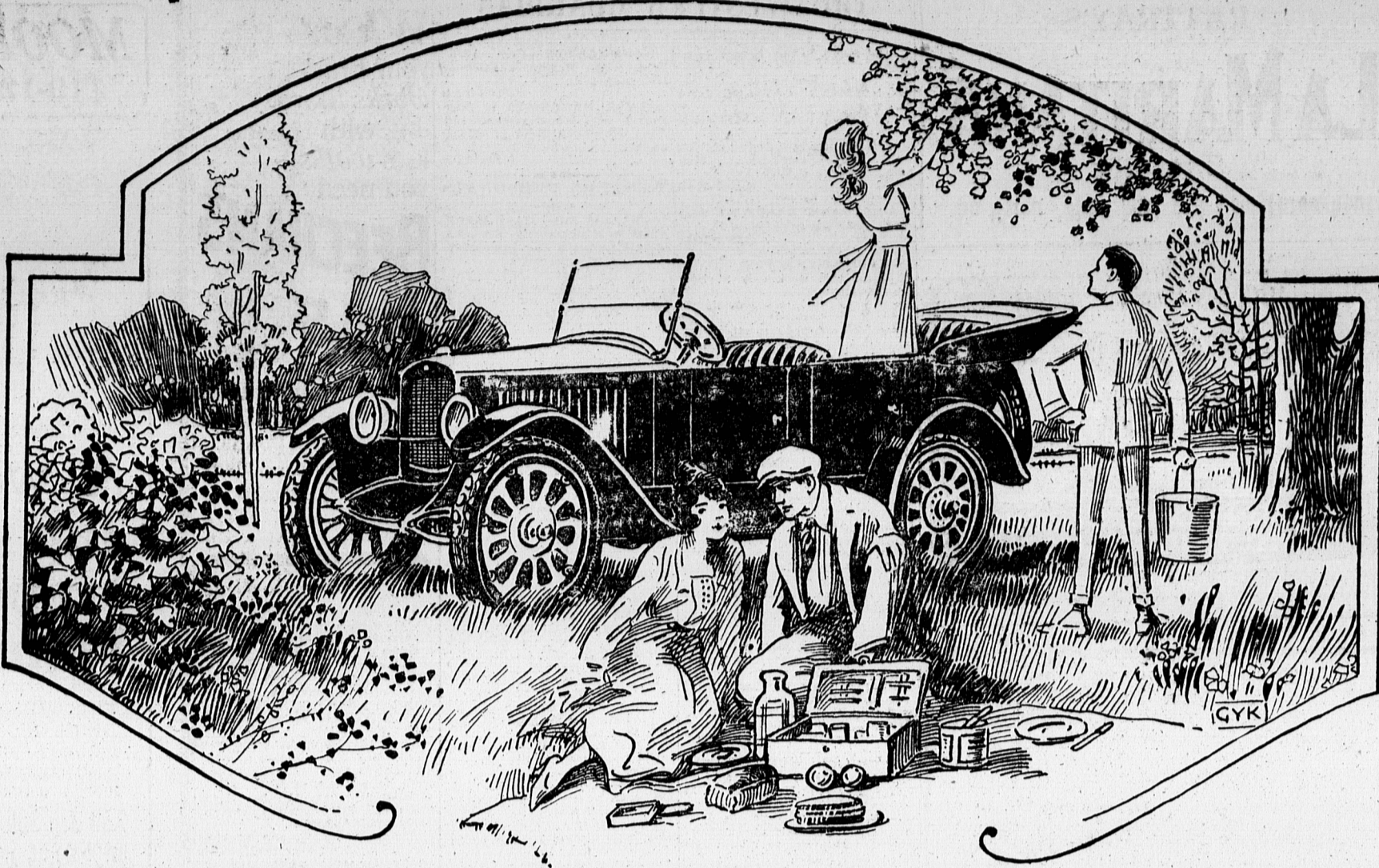
