The many school activities offer countless opportunities for snapping pictures that you will enjoy in years to come.

If there was ever a snapshotter's paradise, it's school for those who attend it. It may be a one-room school or it may be a great university. Wherever, whatever it may be, it's crammed with unbeatable picture possibilities. Yet we might as well face the fact of the matter—few snapshotters make the most of school's snapshotting opportunities. Perhaps they are dazzled by the very wealth of the material at hand. More likely, they assume that somebody else is going to take the pictures. And that's a fatal mistake. For nobody else can see things as you see them. And it's what you see that means most to you—and to the folks at home, now or years from now. The question, then, is how to make the most of school's picture possibilities. A little planning will do the trick. First, about the right camera for school. Any camera will do, providing it is clean and in good order and has a size of film that is easily obtainable anywhere. Clancy Begins Coaching Job With Maroons

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Oct. 4—(AP)—Frank (King) Clancy took over the coaching reins of Montreal Maroons in the National Hockey League from club president Tommy Gorman today. Announced as leader of the Maroon team when Gorman decided his duties as manager of Montreal Forum would take too much of his time this winter, Clancy landed a coaching job nine months after his retirement as a player. He began his professional career under Gorman at Ottawa. Once installed, Clancy started right off by letting it be known his former boss with Toronto Maple Leafs, Conny Smythe, need have no fear about Maroons' style of play. "We're going to have a good, fast, young club that will keep moving," Clancy declared. "Conny needn't worry about us playing open hockey because that's what we're going to feature. "If we find we have defensive men who can rush, they'll rush," he went on. "Anyway, this team is well equipped with forwards and they're going to step this winter." Maroons have no deals on the fire, Clancy said, but they bought Tommy Cook from Cleveland of the International-American League last week, and they expect to draw one or two bright prospects from amateur ranks.

"A scheme whereby Boston would play home and home games with each of the Quebec entries would be perfect," Brown said. He said his team was "as strictly an amateur hockey club as it is possible to be" and was handicapped by being too far away to enter Eastern United States Amateur Hockey League.

"BUCKY" HARRIS RENEWS CONTRACT WASHINGTON, Oct. 4—(AP)—Clark Griffith announced tonight that Stanley (Bucky) Harris has signed a contract to manage Washington Senators for the third straight year. He did not disclose the salary. The Senators finished fourth last year and sixth this year, and there had been recent conjecture over whether Harris would be continued as manager.

Canada To Re-enter Davis Cup Competition Next Year

MONTREAL, Oct. 4—Canada will re-enter Davis Cup tennis competition in 1938, R. N. Watt, President of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, announced tonight. Canada has not competed in the international competition since 1934. Death of players of Davis Cup calibre was the reason generally ascribed for the Dominion's withdrawal from the tournaments. The Tennis Association head made no declaration as to why it had been decided Canada should again try for the trophy, but the United States' winning of the cup this year was conceded to have been a big factor in the decision. While France and Great Britain held the trophy, competition among challengers in the American zone had to be held early in the season. Climatic reasons left Canada at a disadvantage, her players having little but indoor playing behind them when tournament time rolled around. With the United States holding the cup now, American zone play will come later in the summer, since the challenge round will be in the United States. Further, the U. S. absence from elimination rounds will leave Canada stacked up against teams nearer her own class. The tennis head made no mention of possible selections for the team—in fact, he said nothing other than that Canada would be a challenger next year—but it looked fairly certain, on the basis of this summer's play, that the no. 1 singles berth on the squad might be assigned to Montreal's Bobby Murray. The Montrealer took the Quebec and Ontario singles title and went into the Dominion final, to lose to Walter Senior, 12th ranking United States player. Murray played through the Canadian tourney with a shoulder injury. He is still laid up with it, but physicians expect he will be around again about the end of the year. Other possible candidates appear in Ross Wilson of Toronto, Canada's no. 2 ranking player for the last couple of years; Douglas Cameron of Vancouver, no. 1 in 1936 who was put out by Murray in the Dominion semi-finals this year, and Laird Watt of Montreal, only member of the four to have participated in Davis Cup play. Watt was a member of the 1934 team with Gilbert Nunnis, Marcel Reinville and Walter Martin.

Larry Gains Kayoes French Champion Farr Sails For Home Wed., Will Be Back

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Oct. 4—Larry Gains, Toronto negro heavyweight, tonight knocked out Charles Rutz, French heavyweight champion, after 2 minutes, 14 seconds in the second round of a scheduled 10-round bout at Earls Court. Gains weighed 207 3/4 and his opponent 191 1/2. Gains, though slower than he used to be, showed glimpses of his old form in contrast with Rutz who fought crudely and lacked ring craft. The Canadian paved the way with his left for the finishing blow—a crashing right to the jaw. Al Delaney, a Canadian who will fight Pancho Villa of Spain at the National Sporting Club, Earls Court, Oct. 18, was introduced from the ring. The Delaney-Villa clash will be the main bout of the night.

Watch Out For Chiozza Boys, Cause He's In

(By Gayle Talbot, Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Oct. 4—Don't look now but Lou Chiozza, who couldn't hit a pool of water with a paddle, is likely to do most of the center-fielding for the Giants in next week's World Series, otherwise known as the blue ribbon embroglio of baseball. That's interesting because Joe Dimaggio, who plays the same position for the Yankees, is without much doubt the greatest outfielder in the game today. Yankees supporters, in fact, say he is the all-round-everything, and they don't receive a great deal of argument from anybody. It's just like Col. Bill Terry, foreman of the Giants, to stick a fellow like Chiozza in such a spot, where he will play his head off in attempt to outshine the big man against him. It didn't prove bad psychology in the 1933 series against Washington, when Blondy Ryan was paired against the Senators' great shortstop, Joe Cronin. Terry probably relishes the memory of Blondy's play on that occasion. Chiozza wasn't even a regular until a few weeks ago. As a third baseman he had been supplanted by Mel Ott and had been riding the bench for more than a month when at the start of the Giants' recent crucial series with the Cubs at Chicago, Terry sent him to centre. He promptly became a terror both afield and at bat. He was instrumental in the Giants' taking two out of three and has been going at a fast clip ever since. Neither Wally Berger nor Hank Leiber, both heavier hitters, has been able to get him out of there. Although Lou's batting average at last account was only .237 compared with Dimaggio's .348, those who know Terry best believe he will let Chiozza ride through the series, at least against the Yankee right handers.

Newark Bears Win Second Straight Tilt

(By Fritz Howell, Associated Press Sports Writer) COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 4—Atley Donald handcuffed Columbus Red Birds with a three-hit pitching performance here tonight, defeating the American Association champions 1-0 and giving Newark Bears, International League pennant winners, their second straight win in the current Little World Series. Only one Columbus player got as far as second base, King reaching the keystone sack in the last of the ninth, as Donald's great performance put the Bears back into the thick of the fight for the title. The Birds won the first three at Newark. The count now stands at 3-2 in games, with Columbus needing a victory tomorrow night to take the crown, and Newark needing it to force the series to the seven-game limit.
