HALIFAX, May 1 - (Saturday) - (CP) - A Halifax paper said in a newspaper story today that three Nova Scotians - Justice Minister Halsey, Premier Macdonald and Senator Wishart Robertson - are expected in high Liberal circles in Halifax to be considered in the selection of a new national Liberal Party leader at Ottawa in August.

The newspaper said Mr. Halsey, "who has rapidly gained in popularity across the Dominion as a potential successor to Prime Minister Mackenzie King," was regarded as a "definite candidate in the finals" at the Ottawa convention.

It added: "Premier Macdonald and Senator Robertson, Government leader in the Senate, are being spoken of in Liberal Party circles in Halifax as likely dark horses.

Both Premier Macdonald and Senator Robertson, it was said, had backing within the Federal Cabinet and in influential party circles outside.

"Among those reported as pulling for Premier Macdonald were Trade Minister C.D. Howe and a group of prominent Liberals outside the Government who vacationed with the Nova Scotia Premier in the south several months ago."

6. Re-establishment of public confidence in the U.N. is a "must" if Canada is to continue to participate in it. 7. The Government should give more ample opportunity for discussion of foreign affairs.

Mr. Bradette said Canada's voice is highly respected in the United Nations. She had done more per capita than any other country and, despite her participation in two wars, had sought no territorial gains.

Damaged Sealer Is Patched Up - (By The Canadian Press) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 30 - Reports reaching here from Battledore Harbor, Labrador, tonight said the damaged sealer ship Norman Conrad has been patched up but the ice pack has not loosened enough to allow her to be towed to open water.

The Conrad was rafted on the ice pack Tuesday and her 28-man crew was marooned on the pans for two days before another sealer, the Eagle, rescued them. Messages received here indicated the 1,300 pelts aboard the Conrad had been transferred to the Eagle.

Meanwhile, the steamer Codroy towing the damaged sealer Catalina Trader to Catalina, Nfld., has harbored at Quilpon, on the northern tip of Newfoundland, to await improved ice conditions. Bow plates of both ships were damaged.

LOBSTER (Continued from Page 1) supplies, few fishermen built any additional gear last winter, preferring to patch up last season's traps and to make their rope serve as long as possible.

The number of fishermen engaged in the lobster fisheries will not be as great as last year because of the great expense involved in fitting out. In Tignish and Alberton there will be about 160 boats operating with the greater number fishing out of Tignish. At North Lake in King's County, however, more boats than ever will be engaged. One report said there will be about 50 out of Souris and as many fishing out of North Lake.

No ice is reported off any of the harbours so that, if the weather is fine, there will be nothing to prevent most of the fishermen from getting their lines and traps out quickly.

The canned lobster market remains firm. The Guardian was informed, but it is too early to say whether or not the price for this year's catch will equal the \$40 per case paid for last season's catch.
