REVIEW OF HARNESS SEASON IN THE MARITIME PROVINCES

Most Remarkable Year Ever Known, With The Greatest Smashing of Records in History of Provincial Turf.

HALIFAX, N. S., November, 16.—For thirty five years James W. Power, Sporting Editor of the Halifax Acadian RECORDER has been issuing a review of the harness season in the Maritime Provinces, and this year shows the most remarkable season ever known, with the greatest smashing of records in the history of the Provincial turf, and having three of the fastest pacers in the world competing on a Provincial track, and the quartet of fastest pacers owned in Maine also racing in New Brunswick. Through the enterprise of the Fredericton people the Single G., 1.58 1/4, Margaret Dillon 1.58 1/4, and Sir Roch 1.59 1/4, which had been racing on the Grand Circuit, were brought to that city.

Single G. not only established records for the Provinces, but for half mile tracks in Canada. In fact nowhere in the wide Dominion have three such fast record horses appeared as at Fredericton. That place earlier in the season also had the fast pacers from Maine, Jackson Grattan, 2.01 1/4, Roy Grattan, 2.01 1/4, John R. Braden, 2.02 1/4, and Dan Hedgewood, 2.04 1/4, as also did Woodstock, the latter being the first to have Margaret Dillon come to the Provinces this season.

Single G.'s mile at Fredericton in 2.04 1/4 was the fastest ever made on a half mile track in Canada, and also the fastest ever made by a Stallion and his two miles in 2.04 1/4, 2.05 was the fastest ever made in a two heat race. Ed Allen his well known driver, was behind him, John R. Braden, driven by Willard, paced the fastest three heats in a race on a double O in Canada when he won at Fredericton in 2.05 1/4, 2.06 1/4, 2.06 1/4. Another record broken was that for five heats pacing, also at Fredericton, when Zom Q. driven by Sunderlin, won in 2.10 1/4, 2.11 1/4, 2.09 1/4 after Jenny H. with Keyes behind her, won the second and third heats in 2.10 1/4, 1.09 1/4.

The five-heat record for trotters, 2.15 1/4, was also broken at Fredericton when Alfred King driven by Nevers, won in 2.14 1/4, 2.20 1/4 with Bonnie Girl (Gerow) winning the first and fourth heats in 2.14, 2.14 1/4. Her fourth heat lowered the four-year-old trotting record of the Province to 2.14. The record of 2.14 for trotting geldings was three equalled, at Woodstock by Col. Axworthy (Brickley), at Fredericton by Alfred King (Nevers) and at Chatham by Peter Verde (Steele).

The fastest new trotting performer of the year was Captain Jackson, owned by Col. D. A. McKinnon, Charlottetown, and driven by McTague, at Charlotte town in 2.17 1/4 which also lowered the trotting record for Province bred geldings.

Margaret Dillon, owned by C. H. Traiser, Boston, driven by Fleming, lowered the pacing record for mares to 2.07 1/4. Jenny H. owned and driven by S. H. Keyes, St. Stephen, lowered the pacing record for mares owned in the Provinces to 2.09 1/4 at Fredericton.

Colorado L. made a new trotting record for Cape Breton of 2.17 1/4, also the three fastest heats ever trotted in that section in 2.18 1/4, 2.18 1/4, 2.17 1/4. Tommy D. 2.05 1/4, in making a new track record of 2.12 1/4 at Glace Bay, paced the fastest mile ever made on a Cape Breton track. Only nineteen horses entered the 2.30 list, the smallest number in years but thirty-eight already in the list reduced their records, the former of which may be attributed to the large number of matinee races and horses with fast marks and win-race records starting in the slower classes.
