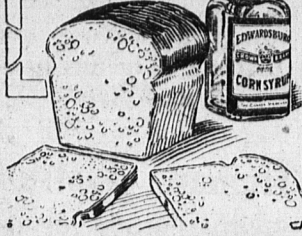

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. THOMAS STAFFORD.

The death occurred at her home in Marcell on Wednesday, May 16, 1917 after a lingering illness of six months and four days of Mrs. Thomas Stafford aged 77 years. She was a native of Nova Scotia, and in 1902 moved to the Island and lived with her only son who resides here. Throughout her life she was a woman of remarkably robust constitution. Her presence will be missed for many a day by her many friends and loving family. She was attended by her pastor the Rev. Father Duffy who administered to her the last rights of the Holy Catholic Church. There are left to mourn their loss two sons, and two daughters—namely William of U. S. A., and David at home; Mrs. S. Drake of Marcell; and Mrs. J. Gotez of Nova Scotia; also one brother and two sisters are left to mourn. Her funeral was largely attended considering the condition of the roads. A Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. Father Duffy. The remains were interred in the adjoining Roman Catholic Church yard, there to await a glorious Resurrection. The pall bearers were Messrs James McGrath, Ambrose Barry, John Boylston, Patrick Murphy, Frank Rossette and John Phelan. May her soul rest in peace.

THE TRURO CITIZEN SAYS.—Mr. Eric E. Dobie, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., and Mr. F. K. Kinsman, of Cambridge, N. S., former students of the Truro College of Agriculture and now of McDonald College, St. Anne, P. Q., have been spending a few days in town before taking up their respective duties for the summer months.

VISITING MISSIONARY.—Rev. R. H. A. Haslam, of Springfield, P. E. I., returned missionary from India, in the course of his itinerary while in this diocese, will visit St. John, Fredericton, Rothesay, Hammond River, Hampton, Norton, Sussex, Kingston and Gagetown. The balance of the missionary deputations work outlined for the year will be carried on by some of the local clergy, Rev. R. P. McKim, Rev. Walter P. Dunham and Rev. G. P. Scovill.

ISLANDERS IN ENGLAND.—In the latest issue of "Canada," published in London, for copies of which The Guardian is indebted to Major F. B. McRae, a number of interesting photos are given in which many Canadian islanders are conspicuous, among them a number of Prince Edward Islanders. An excellent photo of No. 1 Depot Company, Canadian Machine Gun Corps, of which Major McRae is Officer commanding, includes besides the O. C. Lieut. A. W. Allen of this province. The number is an exceptionally interesting one to Canadians.

DISCHARGING VESSEL.—The schooner Joseph P. Johnson, Captain Bonnell, is discharging her cargo of coal at Buntain, Bell & Co.'s wharf. The crew of the schooner is working aboard the vessel and employees of Buntain, Bell & Co. on the wharf. Several longshoremen made threats to Captain Bonnell as to what might happen if he tried to discharge his vessel while the strike was on. The captain replied that any man who stepped aboard the vessel would have to be carried ashore.

50th ANNIVERSARY.—The Montreal Theological College, will during this year, celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of its work as a college. In that year classes were opened in the lecture hall of Erskine church, under the instruction of the late Rev. Dr. Gregg, of Toronto, and Rev. Wm. Atkin, of Smith's Falls (Ont.) on lectures for the session. In 1868 the late Rev. D. H. MacVicar was appointed professor of divinity, and as other members were added to the permanent staff he was elected principal, a position which he occupied until his death in 1902. In 1902 Professor John Scrimger was elected to the principalship, holding the office until his death in 1915. The present principal is Rev. D. J. Fraser a native of Alberton, P. E. I., formerly pastor of St. Stephen's church, St. John (N. B.) having been appointed successor to Principal Scrimger by the general assembly in 1915. Special features will mark the annual convocation of the college in October when Dr. Hugh Black, of Union Seminary, New York, will be the chief speaker.

AS TO ONIONS.

Onions at the present time are in very short supply. In New York the greatest flurry in onions in some years has occurred, so that at this writing they are selling to consumers at 23 to 25 cents. Canadian onions in Halifax are about used up and only a few of the American onions purchased last fall still remain, and these are being sold at a price that would make it necessary to get 14c. per lb. in order to clear cost of handling. At the present time there is an embargo in Great Britain against exportation to all countries of Spanish onions. The custom of the trade at this season of the year is to buy Spanish onions for shipment every other week. In this way it has always been possible until now to keep up an adequate supply, but the situation now is that the market is practically bare. Ordinarily at this time we would have the Antigua onion, which is the earliest of the West India onions to look forward to. Indeed it was expected that shipments would be made next week for Halifax, but now it is found that New York can afford to pay 5c. per lb. more than local buyers so that the onions are going to the New York city market. It will probably be early in May before we have any Bermuda Onions and then only if the trade will pay the Bermuda shippers the same as New York offers. There is no prospect of onions being any cheaper, therefore, for several months. Texas onions will come in
