Tense Situation At Ottawa Over Beauharnois Report

Campaign Contributions To Liberal Party Unanimously Condemned In Report, Which Places Grave Responsibility Upon Mr. MacKenzie King And Denounces Senators MacDougald, Haydon And Raymond.

OTTAWA, July 28.—Strong condemnation of three members of the Senate of Canada—Senators W. L. MacDougald, Andrew Haydon and Donat Raymond, a proposal for continuation of the project through co-operation between the Dominion and the Quebec Governments, a recommendation that "return should be made immediately of any monies improperly taken from the Company's funds for political subscriptions, by which those responsible for their extraction," a declaration that Robert O. Sweezy, H. R. Griffith and at least two other unnamed directors, were the instruments by which about \$300,000 of company funds were misused, for campaign purposes "an assertion that A. C. Henry, Managing Director of the Company, was not a fit and proper person to continue in the direction of the project," were the outstanding features of the final and unanimous report of the special house committee which investigated the Beauharnois Power Project and which was tabled in the House early this evening, by Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Immigration and Mines and Chairman of that committee.

Notice was given by Mr. Gordon that on Thursday of this week he would move in the House that the report be concurred in, and his motion will be the signal for commencement of one of the most momentous debates in parliament in recent years.

From the views expressed by various members the report of the committee can be regarded as unanimous although there is still some uncertainty as to whether or not the Liberals will move an amendment to the motion for concurrence. Their course will be decided at a caucus which it is understood, will be held tomorrow morning.

VIGOROUS CONDEMNATION

Vigorous language is employed by the committee in condemning, in the report, the use of Beauharnois Company's money for party purposes. After recommending that all monies so improperly used be returned to the company, it says, referring to Mr. Sweezy's subscriptions to party funds: "It is to be observed that no pretence is made that the personal subscriptions were because of the adherence of Mr. Sweezy to any particular party and we are of the opinion that they were shamelessly,

wastefully and needlessly made for the express purpose of obtaining favorable consideration of the company's proposals by the Government.

Little weight is attached by the committee to the report that the \$120,000 which was given to John Aird, Jr. of Toronto was intended for the Conservative party in that province.

The report disposes of this incident in the following words: "It is clear there is no evidence before the committee that would indicate that any of these funds have reached any political organization, or any person authorized to receive campaign funds."

Of Mr. Henry the report says: "Mr. Henry's connection with Senator MacDougald and their success in despoiling the company of a large sum of money or monies worth for something that on the evidence was entirely worthless, does not commend him to your committee as a fit and proper person to continue in the management of this great utility."

"CANNOT BE DEFENDED"

Condemning Senator Haydon, who was prominent in the Liberal party organization, the Committee report says:

"Your committee is of opinion that the acceptance of the above mentioned contingent retainer and of the \$50,000 involved and of the campaign funds, by Senator Haydon cannot be defended and is strongly condemned."

Concluding a lengthy recital of the various parts played by Senator MacDougald in the financing of the project the report says: "Senator MacDougald's actions in respect to the Beauharnois project cannot be too strongly condemned."

NO SUGGESTION RE CONTROL

A feature of the report widely commented upon this evening is the absence of any concrete proposals for control or acquisition of the project. More than once it has been suggested that inasmuch as the power canal would eventually be used for the shipping that passes up and down the St. Lawrence River the Federal Government would take over the project as being to the general advantage of Canada. What is proposed, however is that the Federal Government retain its control of jurisdiction as far as navigation interests are affected and leave the development and disposal of the power to whatever interests are acceptable to the Government of Quebec.

This means that the power will remain in private hands and that eventually it is believed, it will be completely controlled by the Holt interests, which are said now to hold a considerable percentage of the stock of the Beauharnois concern. Two points that will be made by the present Federal Government in the debate on this committee report will be:

First, that by the inquiry just concluded and the action to be taken it has saved for the country a great public utility from the manipulation of private interests;

Second: That through the committee inquiry there has been disclosed the dangerous extent to which private individuals interested in a large public undertaking can go in influencing a party or government in furtherance of their plans.

This report which inevitably bears a strong political complexion, even though it has been presented by representatives of three different groups in the House, will deal a severe blow at the Liberal party and the previous King administration, because of the disclosures of the extent to which those associated with the Beauharnois project contributed to Liberal campaign funds.

MACKENZIE KING'S PORTION

While the Liberal leader, Right Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, has already stated in the House that he himself received nothing, to his knowledge, from those interested in the Beauharnois development, yet he is placed in a difficult position by reason of the fact that he was leader of the party and head of

the Government at the time the project received its approval here.

There will be some vehement talk from both sides of the House on this report, and Thursday and Friday which are now expected to be the concluding days of this session, will be marked by more tenseness and more party feeling than has been in evidence since the momentous days of 1926. Quebec members are likely to raise their voice against what they will term an invasion of the private ownership field in Quebec, and Ontario and Western members will present this case as a strong argument in favor of the public ownership of another public utility.
