Fertilizer Plant Workman Injured

On Monday morning Mr. Edward Arsenault, an employee of the Island Fertilizer Company, Summerside, narrowly escaped serious injury while working in the plant storehouse. Mr. Arsenault, at the time of the accident was engaged in shovelling up the fertilizer at the base of the high pile. Some time previous a small charge of dynamite had been used to loosen up the product and as a result an overhang of the fertilizer was suspended above. Mr. Arsenault was working below this overhang when it suddenly broke loose causing a landslide in which Mr. Arsenault was buried. Fortunately he was rescued before being seriously injured and taken to the Prince County Hospital where his injuries were attended to. Mr. Arsenault has since been confined to his home but expects to be back at his duties in a few days.

C.C.F. Speaker Says Controls Are Inevitable

'Controls are inevitable in modern society and the problem facing us today is who is going to exercise these controls,' stated Fred M. Young, Maritime director of the C.C.F. last night speaking in New Glasgow Hall. Mr. Young claimed that controls in the hands of Parliament during the war resulted in a 'fairer distribution of wealth than we ever had before.' Today these controls are being handed back to the Canadian monopolies which are as a result raising prices and making greater profits than ever before. Mr. Young contended that C.C.F. policy is designed to retain controls in the hands of the elected representatives of the people rather than give them back to big business as the old parties are doing. The problem facing the P.E.I. farmer today, declared the speaker, is whether packing and processing monopolies are to control production and marketing of his produce or whether farmers themselves do it through their own organizations and government boards. Douglas MacBrien, P.E.I. C.C.F. organizer, emphasized the need for a strong party organization in order to contest the coming

(Continued from Page 1) of the heavy inheritance tax immediately became prominent. The same question, and its relation to the value of Ford Motor Co. stock, presumably will arise with Ford's death. The automobile industry, which for years feared Ford as a keen competitor while respecting him as a genius in his field, was quick to send its condolences on his death. Alfred Sloan, Jr., board chairman of General Motors Corp., among Ford's most bitter industrial rivals, hailed him as typifying 'the best in American enterprise' and president C. E. Wilson lauded 'his perseverance in overcoming heavy odds at a time when the things he worked at were considered impractical.' The United Auto Workers (C. I. O.), who fought a small-scale but bloody war to win recognition in Ford plants, sent its 'sincere condolences' to the family but withheld further comment. Ford, born on a farm near Dearborn on July 30, 1863, became one of the world's best known figures. His first job in a machine shop paid him \$2.50 a week, less than his room and board. So he augmented it by working nights. From that beginning came a man with a sound, basic knowledge of mechanics, a shrewd sense of the value of money and a serene self-confidence that led him to confide in later years that he never worried about anything in his life except his wife's well-being.
