THE WAR AND THE LIBERAL PARTY

Lord Haldane's Revelation

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.—Canadian Liberal newspapers which scoffed at the possibility of war a few years ago and became determined blockers of all attempts to prepare for Canadian self-defence or defence of the Empire now seek to serve their party by a campaign of invective against some features of the hasty efforts of this country to fit itself to take part in the present struggle. Up to the very eve of hostilities they were ridiculing the idea of "conspiracy." They denounced in unmeasured terms the efforts of the Borden Government to make our militia efficient. The "gold lace" of the headquarters staff was a constant subject of sneers. School Cadets and Boy Scouts were regarded with suspicion. Sir John French advised reorganizing and strengthening the militia force and was jeered at by Liberal members. Sir Ian Hamilton recommended the purchase of 300 machine guns, and was denounced as a fool. The suggestion that Canada might equip day be called upon to raise and supply 160,000 men was regarded by the "Toronto" Globe, as an infallible evidence of lunacy.

A Right About Turn

Yet since the war came upon us, finding us wholly unprepared, and all sorts of attempts had to be made in desperate haste to combat forty years of German preparation, these same Liberal newspapers which had damned "vociferously" all idea of "emergency," or precaution, started often and early to shriek about the villainy their country was exhibiting in its unequal struggle with the gigantic new task. Every Government step has been dogged, every act viewed with suspicion; every seeming irregularity in the vast tide of sudden war business has been seized on as an evidence of Conservative corruption; every excess of price here and there in some limited transaction among vast transactions has been pictured as a proof of gigantic secret Conservative evil; any trouble with recruiting, with the recruiting equipping and training of tens and scores of thousands of men among a civilian population scattered over a continent, utterly foreign to all ideas of war or discipline or official routine has been held up as an example of intolerable administrative inefficiency. Such newspapers as the "Toronto" Globe, the Montreal Herald and the Manitoba Free Press, such men as Rev. J. A. Macdonald and Henri Bourassa, all of them in former times scoffers at "emergency," denouncers of so-called militarism, given to disclaiming our armours for our militia, and exhibiting a smug horror at the silly dream that the terrific armed camp into which Germany had converted itself menaced its neighbors—these newspapers and men have poured forth since war began a disproportionate flood of suspicion and sneers upon the new birth among us of inexperienced desperate effort to embark on new paths in which we may play a manly part in the Empire's battle for life.

Haldane's Warning

It was not for want of warning. Their partisanship might have explained their sneering incredulity at the silly dream that the terrific armed camp into which Germany had converted itself menaced its neighbors; but warning came to them from quarters which had nothing to do with Canadian politics. Facts are coming to light which make this all too clear. In the course of a notable address in Great Britain some few days ago, Vis-

count Haldane, former British Secretary for War, lifted a corner of the curtain on a question which has a vital relation to political history in this country just previous to the war. He said: "It is charged against me that I failed to warn the Government of this country of the German menace. That charge I absolutely deny. When I returned from my visit to Germany in 1912 I placed in the hands of the Government a secret memorandum setting out the international situation and outlining German preparations for war."

Let us see what this means, and how it related to Canada. When Lord Haldane visited Berlin in 1912, he did so at the special request of the Kaiser himself, in order to consider how Anglo-German misunderstandings, might be removed, and two days before his visit took place, proposals for large increases in the German army and navy were laid before the Reichstag. The proposal made to Lord Haldane was that Germany would "retard" though would not abandon, or reduce, her naval programme, provided the British Government would agree to remain neutral in any war Germany might wage. What happened? The scales fell from the eyes of Lord Haldane. The Kaiser's demand of a free hand for European conquest as the price of a friendly understanding with Great Britain, could mean one thing only—that Germany was bent on conquest and gain. Lord Haldane now tells us for the first time that he prepared a secret memorandum outlining the situation, for the British Government. We all know the result. The Government of Great Britain, thoroughly alarmed, speeded up its own naval programme, and advised the Canadian Government that it could help to ward off the German blow by providing three of the most powerful battleships that "science could devise and money supply."

Laurier Knew It All

The facts outlined by Lord Haldane were included in a secret memorandum sent by the Imperial authorities to the Borden Government; in fullest measure the recommendations for three dreadnoughts was shown Sir Wilfred Laurier by Sir Robert Borden. It is not necessary to dwell at length upon the result despite the Kaiser's infamous attempt to tie the Great Britain's hands, the Admiralty's solemn request for aid, Sir Wilfred Laurier's leaning his back on the Empire and balked the measure that might have changed the whole course of history. By a series of organized attacks on the present Government's conduct of the war Liberal newspapers now hope to absolve the party leaders from that crime—but they cannot succeed. One might think that that good motto for the Liberal press these days would be found in the pages of Hamlet, "The rest is silence." Yet under the false guise of patriotism it is screaming hysterically against the Admiralty's solemn request for aid, Sir Wilfred Laurier's leaning his back on the Empire and balked the measure that might have changed the whole course of history.

Those Who Are To Blame

Don't let us blame our leaders and our people now, as much as those who beforehand did their best to prevent us doing ourselves half justice in support of our men who are falling in France for the cause of human freedom.

FIRE RAGING IN HOLD OF STMR. CARLETON

HALIFAX, Dec. 7.—The British steamer Carleton reached port yesterday morning on fire. She is from New York and bound to the other side. The seriousness of the fire is not definitely known. The steamer is heavily laden with sugar. The cause of the fire, the captain told the press, is not yet known, but it is the belief of some of the ship's crew that it is another case of incendiarism by German secret service men. The steamer was guarded during the loading of the cargo at New York and every precaution taken to prevent bombs or other explosives being secreted in the holds.
