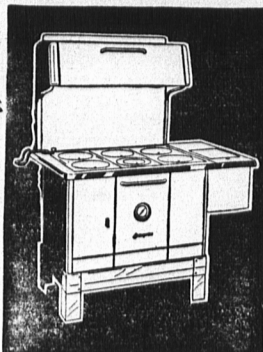

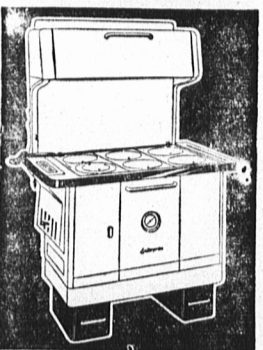

Officials Change on T. C. Air Lines

MONTREAL August 20—The resignation of D. B. Colyer, Vice-President, Trans Canada Air Lines, and the appointment of O. T. Larson, General Superintendent, to succeed him was announced today by H. J. Symington, K. C., President of TCA.

Mr. Colyer is resigning after four years spent organizing and developing Canada's National Air Service. "In Mr. Colyer we lose an aviation executive of outstanding ability. The work he has accomplished for aviation as a whole as well as for TCA will keep this country to the forefront in aeronautics for many years to come. The organization to a man is sorry to see him leave," said Mr. Symington.

Trans-Canada Air Lines as Chief Technical Adviser at the start of the Company in August 1937. He was previously Vice-President in Charge of operations for United Air Lines. In his new post he was largely responsible for the technical side of this big operation of flying Canada from coast to coast twice daily. Upon the retirement of P. G. Johnson from the TCA Vice-presidency in 1939 to become president of Boeing Aircraft Corp Mr. Colyer was promoted from Chief Technical Advisor to the post of Vice-President.

O. T. Larson, who becomes Vice-President in Mr. Colyer's stead joined the staff of TCA in the Fall of 1937. His first task was to organize the line's meteorological and Dispatch Departments, among the most important posts in the new service. He was made General Superintendent of TCA in September 1939. At 37 he is one of the youngest aviation executives on the continent.

Mr. Larson stepped right into aviation when he graduated from College and joined the U. S. Government Meteorological Service. In 1929 he joined Boeing Air Transport. Forrunner of United Air Lines and eventually took charge of that Transcontinental Air Line's Meteorological and Dispatch Departments. No one in Canada is more familiar with the Airway from Coast to Coast than Mr. Larson. He has flown 100,000 miles a year over TCA Routes and knows all of the line's employees intimately.

MISS MARGARET A. SULLIVAN

The death of Miss Margaret A. Sullivan occurred at her home in Cape Wolfe, Lot 7, P.E.I., on August 21, after a lingering illness, borne with true Christian patience. She was 67 years of age and was the daughter of the late Daniel Sullivan, and his wife Ellen O'Connor of Hope River, Lot 22. After teaching in the public schools of this Province for a number of years the late Miss Sullivan took up residence in the United States, where she had been Supv. of Nurses. On account of ill health she was forced to retire from active service about two years ago, and she returned to this Island Province she loved so well, to spend her last days in her lovely farm home at Cape Wolfe, where as a young girl she had taught school. She was tenderly cared for in her long illness by her niece Alleen Howard, R. N., and her brother John Sullivan. There are left to mourn a husband, James Sullivan, of Cape Wolfe and Daniel W. Halliburton, Lot 7 and one sister, Mrs. John A. Stewart, Charlottetown besides a number of nieces and nephews. The funeral services were held at St. Mark's Church, Lot 7, on August 21st, where a Requiem High Mass was sung by Rev. Father Francis. Interment in St. Mark's cemetery. The pall bearers were: Thomas Howard, William Fish, Johnstone Cook, Clement O'Connor, Fulton Cook and Peter Bulger, Jr. The numerous Mass Cards flowers and messages of sympathy received during the high esteem in which the deceased was held. Military Parade On Sunday

On Sunday morning at 9.45 there will be a parade of Army and Navy units for Church service. The Protestants will attend a Drum Head Service to take place on the Cricket Field at Victoria Park and the Catholic Service will be held in the Armouries.

After divine services the combined units will meet at the Armouries for a route march so that citizens may see the parade before attending their own regular church services. The route of march will be as follows: The Armouries, thence via Kent Street to Pownall, South on Pownall to Grafton Street, on Grafton to Prince and north on Prince to Easton Street and Brighton Road. His Hon. Lieut. Governor B. W. LePage who will attend the Drum Head Service at the Park will take the Salute in front of the Public Library.

The parade will be in charge of the commanding officer, Lt. Col. F. I. Andrew and men.

Scout News and Notices

Toronto's A. R. P. organization calls for the use of Scout bicycle and foot messengers at each of the city's 2,602 Warden Posts.

The Town Council of High River, Alta., has transferred to the local Boy Scouts a site adjacent to the town park for the erection of a Scout hall.

An Edmonton call for a number of young men as hospital orderlies in the R. C. A. F. specially mentioned former Boy Scouts well schooled in first aid.

The Boy Scouts of Granby, Que., whose salvage campaign last summer produced \$476 for the Red Cross, are in charge of the national salvage campaign in that district.

Three small Wolf Cubs of the 17th Winnipeg Cub Pack called at the City Hall with a cheque for \$21, "for the London Lord Mayor's Fund." They said the money had been raised by a Cub concert.

Two truckloads of stage scenery, picnic benches, dishes and cutlery was the unusual but most acceptable out-of-town donation to the hall of the Boy Scouts of Cranbrook, B. C. — a contribution came from Lumberton.

During a blackout practice at St. Andrew's N. B., stretcher bearers, mostly Boy Scouts, brought in 13 "casualties," according to a press report, "and only lost one man. And his death must have been exaggerated as he was seen on the street next day."

Birmingham Boy Scouts carried out "first aid" repairs at a first aid post during a heavy rain. The doorways which might have been necessary to close the post to the reception of casualties. The installation of emergency lights and the gas-proofing of the doors were two of the jobs efficiently done. Regularly the boys take turns as fire-spotters and fire-fighters at the post.

A war service unit of 80 Birkenhead Boy Scouts has made a specialty of recovering furniture from bombed homes.

Some 75 Wolf Cubs and Boy Scouts were marched to the Newmarket, Ont., salvage warehouse for an evening's hard work. It didn't prove so hard. A hot dog "feed" reward for good service.

Candidate for the strangest contribution to the National Salvage campaign is an ancient hearse. It was pulled out of retirement by a "six-horse team" of Boy Scouts, and created something of a street sensation. Demonstrating Scout ingenuity, two of its wheels are again rolling usefully, and presumably much more happily, beneath a Scout salvage-collecting trolley.

That private land which hitherto has produced pheasants might offer the war, better be devoted to the raising of finer human beings was a plea by Dr. Ruth Fry, Chairman of London Juvenile Clubs, in the course of a lecture to the "Apostrophe Club" Scouts. "Apart from formal education," said Dr. Fry, "far more might be should be done to help our boys
