'No Comment' From Ottawa Sources On Farm Strike

By George Kitchen Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, Sept. 18—(CP)—The federal government has said it has no comment on the 12-day-old Alberta farm strike but there was a growing feeling that the government would receive cabinet attention when Agriculture Minister Gerald McLeod is expected to return to the capital Friday.

Meanwhile, there also was no indication here as to the effect of the federal government's refusal to deliver their produce to the market.

However, it was recalled that before the strike began one government spokesman said the non-delivery action would affect the port rather than domestic supplies. At the same time on one side of the strike area, the refusal of the 29,000 striking farmers to deliver their produce to the market.

The strike-created shortages of meat, eggs and cream seemed to be centered mainly in the strike areas themselves.

CHARGES GOVERNMENT WITH DODGING ISSUE IN FARMERS' STRIKE—HALIFAX, Sept. 18—(CP)—(Advance)—M. J. Coldwell, C.C. leader tonight charged the Federal Government with "trying to avoid the embarrassment of having to face the facts" before the glare of Canadian public opinion" in its handling of the western farm strike situation.

Mr. Coldwell said the request of the farmers was simply that an independent and impartial committee be set up, representative of farmers, labor, the community and the government, to investigate what would be a just parity price for farm products.

Such a request was "reasonable," yet the government had refused to agree.

"One cannot help reaching the conclusion that such a committee would arrive at price higher than the government is willing to pay," Mr. Coldwell said.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18—(AP)—A group of Canadian newspaper producers is scheduled to meet here tomorrow with United States publishers to discuss the world-wide scramble for newsprint.

Many American publishers have been short of newsprint they have been forced to ration advertising, and it was reported that the shortage would be made tomorrow to increase exports to this country from Canada, the principal source of supply.

As many as 12 Canadian producers were expected by spokesmen for the American Newspaper Publishers Association. Possibly as many publishers also will sit in.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18—(AP)—The United States shipping strike today headed into its third week with no signs of an early end to the blockage of the country's seaports.

Leaders of the National Maritime Union (N.M.U.) and representatives of Atlantic and gulf coast ship owners haven't met since Sunday when negotiations ended abruptly because the ship owners said security watches were removed from idle ships in New York harbor.

Will Discuss World Supply Of Newsprint

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Speakers for the Marine Cooks and Stewards Union (C.I.O.) and the independent marine firemen, oilers, wipers and water-tenders have yet to meet with ship owners over the Pacific coast who refuse to arbitrate the dispute until the striking seamen return to work.

The C.I.O. committee for Maritime Unity said 80,000 men are idle on the three coasts, but still the shipping industry appeared to be undisturbed almost as effectively as when union leaders claimed 500,000 men were idle in the joint C.I.O.-A.F.L. walkout.

Some movement was detected in scattered seaports, principally on the east coast and the gulf, due to release of foreign vessels and A.F.L.-manned ships from the C.I.O. seamen's picket lines.

The N.M.U. seamen are demanding a \$5-a-month raise on the west coast, \$10 a month on the Atlantic and gulf coasts. This would bring them up to the scale of A. F. L. seamen who won similar raises a week ago.

The present scale for the N. M. U. seamen affected by the wage demands is \$145 a month.

NEED CARE IN USING 2, 4-D WEED KILLER—A warning about the use of the hormone weed-killer 2,4-D has been issued by the Division of Botany and Plant Pathology, Science Ser-

vice, Dominion Department of Agriculture. Cases are on record, states the Division, where the application of this weed killer has resulted in injury to nearby vegetable gardens or flower beds. At a time when major emphasis is being placed on food production, all possible care should be taken to prevent damage to garden plots.

2,4-D is selective in its nature when applied in its normal concentration to weeds in lawns, but many vegetables, ornamental garden plants, shrubs and trees are just as likely to be injured as are the broad-leaved weeds.

The following precautions should be observed when applying 2,4-D:— 1. Keep well away from all ornamental plants and garden plots. 2. Do not apply 2,4-D or a windy day. The wind will carry the fine spray for some distance. 3. Clean out all spray apparatus mixing pills, or watering cans with hot soapy water or washing soda, followed with a thorough flushing out with warm water before using for any other purpose.
