All other "Help Wanted" advertisements, however, must be submitted by the advertiser to the National Selective Service officer, Unemployment Insurance Commission, I. O. O. F. Hall, Richmond Street, and on receiving the officer's approval the advertisements can then be inserted in The Charlottetown Guardian.

Toronto, Sept. 16-(CP)-Stock and gold gains were posted by four groups in today's trading on the Toronto exchange. Action was dull compared with that of the previous session and volume was down to 84,000 shares against 252,000 Tuesday.

The industrials erased a small Monday loss and finished 0.09 up, mainly on the strength of the 100s and utilities. Compared with Tuesday's trade of 151,000 shares in Ontario Nickel only 12,000 shares of the stock changed hands today and the price closed 1/4 up at 13 1/2. Ventures gained 1/2 to 3/4, Falconbridge 10 to 2 1/2 and Sherritt was off a cent to a new low for the year at 57. Gold stocks moved irregularly. British Dominion was again the only active issue of the western oil group and it firmed a cent to 20.

MONTREAL, Sept. 16-(CP)-All averages indicated a light trading today on the stock exchange and auto market. Winnipeg Electric preferred edged up 1/4 and the price on the stock exchange in utilities and Canadian was also a winner. Canada Northern Power was snatched. Canada Steamship advanced in carriers and in industrial Canadian Locomotive and Canada Locomotive was also a winner. Canadian Car retained an easy loss. Hollinger moved up sharply in mines and McCall-frontier slipped in oil. In miscellaneous Commerce and National Breweries hardened and Penmans dropped back. Among banks, Canadienne fell to a new low, Commerce was off a point, and Royal was 3 points stronger. Total sales, 5,900 shares; Industrials, 4,700; Mines, 1,200.

He then crossed to England and took part in the Battle of Dunkirk and with thousands of others barely escaped with his life. He will be very kindly remembered by many friends here and their sympathy will go out to his fiancée, Miss Lillian Grace MacPhee of this city and his bereaved father, mother and only sister Ellen in London. A keen worker, happy in his associations with his superior's and a general favorite with his fellow airmen he will be deeply mourned by all.

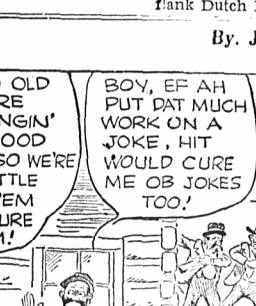
