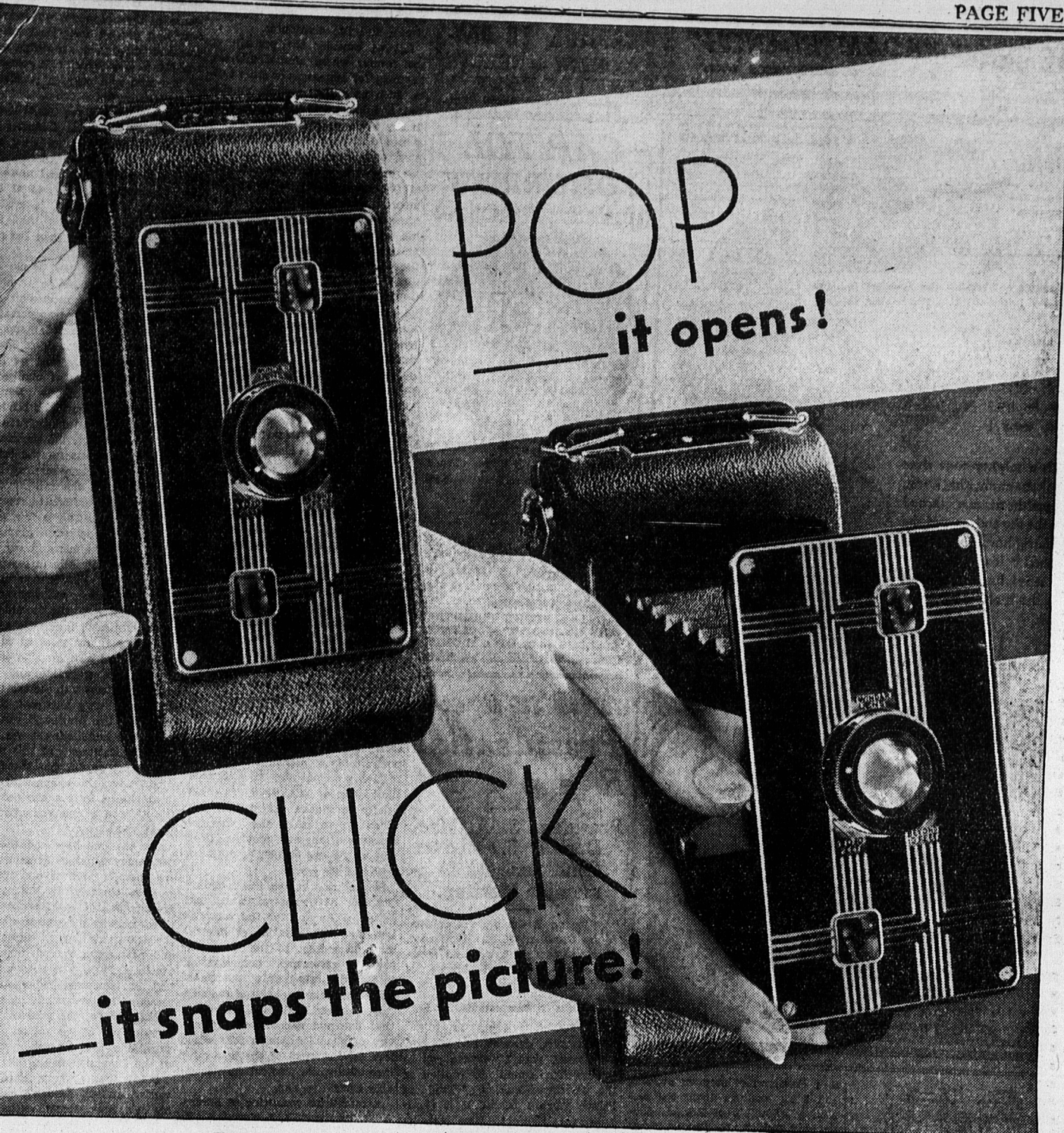

LORD M'MILLAN IMPRESSED WITH WESTERN TOUR

Commission Will Have Report Ready For Next Session of Parliament.

MONTREAL, Aug. 29—(O.P.)—The report of the Royal Commission on Banking will be handed to the Government in ample time to allow of its consideration before the next session of Parliament, Lord Macmillan, Chairman of the Commission, said today. The Chief Commissioner, who with his four colleagues spent a quiet weekend here before leaving for the Maritime Provinces, received newspapermen for a few minutes this evening in his private car.

Valuable Trip

He explained that he could not discuss matters which were before the Commission for consideration, but he referred with pleasure to the western trip which has just been concluded. It had been most valuable to Sir Charles Addis and himself in particular, and would enable

the Commission to consider the financial problems of Canada after close contact with many of those directly interested. He had been impressed with the diversity of Canada, both in respect to the nature of the country and also in regard to the nature of the financial problems which should be solved. The Commission must turn its attention to the question of whether or not the present banking and financial system was adequate to the needs of the country, and, if not what changes were required. He did not think that the solution of Canada's problems lay in the small bank. The large banks of Canada had stood up admirably through the years of depression, in contrast to what had occurred south of the line where failures were numerous.

TOWN CRIER STILL RETAINS PLACE RURAL BRITAIN

LONDON, Aug. 29.—The official possessor of the toughest lungs in the United Kingdom is W. B. Anglis, town crier of Marlborough, Wiltshire. Aged 63, he won the championship from 12 rivals in the national town-criers' annual contest at Lyme Regis, one of the most picturesque of the many ancient customs still religiously observed. For a couple of hours today competitors in uniforms reminiscent of Dick Turpin's days rang their bells and shouted "Oyez, Oyez," at the top of their voices, and delivered a test proclamation. The three judges included Ian Fraser, blind member of the House of Commons, and they were enclosed in a tent 100 yards from the yelling contestants. People are apt to scoff at the town-criers in these days of wireless, modestly said the winner. "But they are still useful in the small boroughs."

Apple Crop In Good Condition
