ONTARIO FLOUR DOWN.—The expected drop of fifty cents in Ontario flour, to correspond with the drop in Manitoba already recorded, was announced Friday. This makes the wholesale price of Ontario flour \$13.05 per barrel. Manitoba remains at \$14, says the St. John Telegraph.

CONCERNING PRODUCE.—Profiting by the example set by the town Council of North Sydney, the civic rulers in Halifax have amended their charter by eliminating from the bye laws the clause which entails a charge upon owners of vessels who bring produce from P. E. Island and sell same at the wharves. While the change may not meet with the approval of some merchants, it will prove a great benefit to the ordinary householder, who will get the benefit of the middleman's profits.—North Sydney Herald. LARGE CATTLE SHIPMENTS.—This has been a great week for Victoria, the little village by the sea. On Wednesday last, Mr. E. T. Saunders, representing the firm of Messrs. Saunders, Newsome & Co., of Charlottetown, arrived, and very soon cattle commenced to pour in with the expectation that the S. S. Harland would make her regular trip on Thursday morning. Towards the close of Wednesday Mr. Frank L. Drake, another cattle buyer and representing The Island Cold Storage Co., also of Charlottetown, put in an appearance and was making in all over one hundred head of cattle waiting for shipment to the metropolis of the province. This was a sight not very often seen on this section of the island, one hundred and twenty head of cattle in all waiting for a steamer. The recent accident to the "Harland" made it necessary that the cattle be held here until Friday evening, when the "Harland" arrived, and have the shipment made and a return trip taken the balance on Friday. It has been said by men of some experience once that this was the finest lot of cattle ever moved on P. E. Island. The amount of money paid out by the two buyers represented a little over twenty thousand dollars, while the residents were all very sorry that Mr. Saunders and Mr. Drake had to remain over so long in their little village, their loss was in a great measure Victoria's gain. Mr. Saunders possesses a magnificent tenor voice, and spent much of his leisure time making waiting for the "Harland" at the home of Mr. Howard Fowler, whose wife is an accomplished musician, and who accompanied Mr. Saunders in his vocal selections. At times the street opposite the Howland home was crowded with listeners, and each selection by the gifted singer brought rounds of applause. Mr. Drake was very agreeable, and left quite an impression on the people. The popular merchant, Mr. Calvin Howland did the weighing of the cattle which was no small job. France, May 9, 1917.

Warns Russia of a Food Shortage.

PETROGRAD, via London.—The Food Minister, M. Pleschchonnoff today unfolded the serious economic situation to the Congress of delegates from the front, in explaining that it had been impossible as yet to establish a grain monopoly owing to the complicated organization required.

On the eve of the revolution, he said, there was virtually no wheat available. The supplies had increased in March but dwindled again in April.

The army requirement was 18,000,000 pounds of wheat weekly, but at one time only 5,000,000 arrived. The shipments now arriving were bigger, but were far from normal, and the people would probably be obliged to face a still further shortage. Other grains, especially oats, were also scarce. He feared that even after the grain monopoly was organized the situation would not be improved, because suspicious of paper money, the peasants demanded raw materials and iron implements in exchange for their produce.

The central committee which has in charge the regulation of iron supply, contained the Minister, has only 3,000,000 pounds of iron on hand, while the munitions factories required 20,000,000.

Hence Russia is on the eve of a catastrophe, he declared, unless the population, particularly the peasants, prepared for the greatest self sacrifice.

FEAR THAT BELGIANS MAY LEARN THE TRUTH.

HAVRE.—A fine of ten thousand marks and three years' imprisonment are the penalties imposed by the German authorities on Belgians who dare pick up proclamations or objects of any nature dropped by Allied aviators in invaded territory. The inhabitants are forbidden to approach any flying machine that may be obliged to light in Belgian territory, and are obliged, whenever an aviator lets fall any object whatever, to notify the burkmaster, who, in turn, must report immediately to the kommandantur.

This measure is supposed in Belgium to be intended to put an end to propaganda by the aviators of the Belgian, French and British flying corps, who have until now succeeded in keeping the Belgians remaining in occupied territory more or less posted on the military situation.

PLACING RUSSIAN ORDERS.

NEW YORK. It is expected that a substantial part of the loans, Russia gets in this country will be used to purchase railway rolling stock. Before the revolution Russian agents were dickering with American manufacturers for thousands of cars and several hundred locomotives. Now it is reported that contracts for fully ten thousand cars will probably be closed in a few days and probably 400 locomotives as well. Deliveries, of course, will have to be extended over a long period.
