LEOPARDS' CHOICE FOOD.

No form of food, except, perhaps, the dog, is so acceptable to the leopard in the jungles of Ceylon as the large grey Wanderoo monkey, and the artistic methods of capture employed by them necessitate no tree climbing, writes an explorer in an exchange.

Whenever monkeys catch a sight of a leopard blinking under the trees they become greatly excited and all chatter together. As soon as the leopard hears this he lies down under a bush and begins to click his teeth together.

This noise seems to make the monkeys beside themselves with terror and excitement; they huddle together in the treetop above the leopard's head, jumping up and down on the branches, shrieking and chattering. Below, the leopard waits motionless, clicking its teeth, until suddenly one of the monkeys misses its footing and comes to the ground with a thud—and then the leopard is on it in a bound.

"One day I saw the first net of the tragedy. I was travelling in thick jungle, and, my bullock carts having gone on in the early afternoon, I was following later in the evening down the same jungle track. I noticed that a large leopard had been following behind the bullocks and that he had suddenly turned aside down a small game track. At the same moment I became aware of a tremendous chattering of monkeys in the distance.

I had a Cingalese with me, and we crept through the thick jungle towards the noise. After crawling about 150 yards I saw about fifteen or 20 monkeys jumping on the top of a small tree.

They seemed to be looking down at something on the other side of a large bush which was in front of me, and when they saw us they kept on turning their heads that way, and then to this something, leaping up and down and shrieking perpetually—and, as it appeared to me, gesticulating and beckoning to us with their long, grey thin arms. The same thought came to the Cingalese, for he whispered to me, "They are beckoning to you to shoot."

I lay still for a moment, thinking which side of the bush it was best to crawl round, and then I distinctly heard the click, click, of the leopard's teeth behind it. I chose the wrong side, for as I came around all I saw was the leopard disappear in a great curving bound into the thick jungle beyond.

ON LUBIN'S PICTURE FARM

In this column a few days ago there was an account of a suit brought by a moving picture war correspondent against the well-known firm of Pathe Freres, and some inkling of the amount spent on securing war pictures was given. So cleverly, however, can these pictures be faked, that it would appear almost superfluous to send photographers to the theatre of war. For instance, Siegfried Lubin, one of the most famous of moving picture manufacturers, has a 500-acre estate at Betswood, a short distance from Philadelphia, and here have been staged many of the thrilling war pictures most of us have seen in local theatres. A noted production of the Lubin firm was the "Battle of Shiloh," second edition. Several military experts were engaged to plan the mimic combat to resemble as nearly as possible the real fight. It cost Lubin \$50,000 to set the film. The United States Government lent him 500 marines for five days. There were 220 superns to represent the Confederates and 200 women and children to give color to the play.

SAVING \$50,000 FOR A PLAY

It cost Lubin \$3,500 a day to pay salaries and feed this multitude, and the property destroyed in the course of the combat amounted to tens of thousands of dollars. The "Sunken Village" was another play that cost slightly more than the "Battle of Shiloh." It required the labors of 100 carpenters for four months to create the village, which was built over a dynamite mine, and the feature of the film was the explosion which made a rubbish of the many thousands of dollars worth of material and labor. A correspondent who visited the Lubin workshop in Philadelphia, saw two films being simultaneously upon one floor, the stars of the various companies crowded each other so closely were they placed.

MUCH INGENUITY EXPENDED MAKING MOVING PICTURES

A Toronto man who was at a moving picture show a few evenings ago remarked that if he could do his work as well as the creators of moving pictures did theirs he would consider himself one of the sights of the city. The thought must often have occurred to the millions who daily visit the movies that the ingenuity expended upon the making of the pictures verges upon genius, and there can be no doubt that wonderful as to how the effects are produced is partly responsible for the tremendous popularity of this form of amusement. As to the popularity of the movies, a few unofficial figures concerning the industry in the United States will suffice and what is true in the United States is true, relatively to population of Canada. There are eighteen thousand moving picture houses in the United States, and the average daily attendance is seven million two hundred thousand. Annually about two hundred and seventy-five million dollars is taken in at the wickets, mostly in dimes and nickels. There is twenty-five million dollars invested in plant, fifty million dollars in finished pictures, and one hundred and twenty million dollars in theatres.
