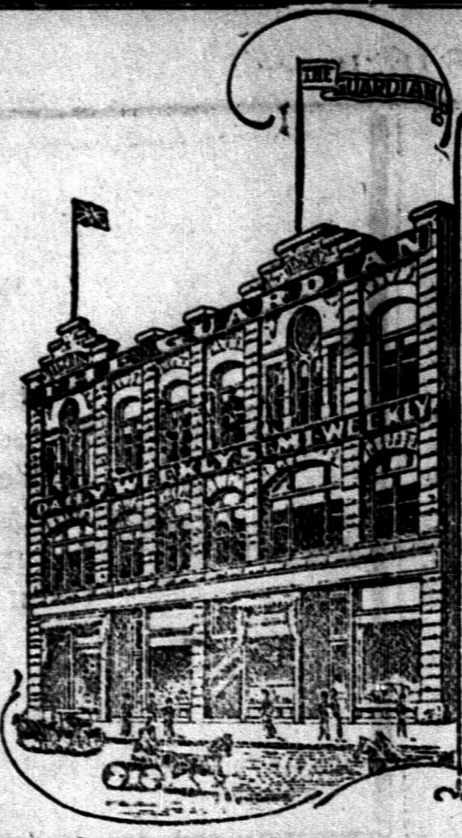

BRITISH PRESS OPINION.

There is no lack of variety in the British press opinions on the report of the Colonial Conference. None the less they afford interesting reading. Here is a summary from a recent cable despatch:

The Daily News, referring to the preferential resolutions say:—"We should not be surprised if these ended a pious wish and no result could be better."

The Morning Post says the Conference did little more than mark time.

The Times says the resolutions and their results show a satisfactory unanimity upon general principles.

The Telegraph calls the Conference a gigantic step forward in the direction of Imperial consolidation.

The Colonial Secretary's offer to favorably consider the representation of the colonies in the Imperial Parliament appeals to the Daily Mail as an indication of something approaching a constitutional revolution.

Other morning journals comment favorably.

From these contradictory views we may learn to what the Times has to say about

the Canadian preference in favor of British goods. It says that notwithstanding the Canadian preference of 33.13 per cent on British goods the ad valorem burden upon British imports to Canada is higher than the ad valorem burden borne by the general trade with other countries. "Our exports to Canada," the Times says, "pay 18 per cent ad valorem in spite of the preference while American goods on the whole pay only 12 per cent., and the burden upon all Canadian imports taken together is 16 per cent."

This complaint of The Times is unfair and unreasonable. The figures quoted by the great London journal give an entirely erroneous view of the case. We import immense quantities of raw material from foreign countries, notably from the United States. This we either admit free or at a comparatively low rate of duty, alike in the interest of our manufacturers and of the mass of consumers. Britain has no raw material to send us. What she has to send are manufactures, and on these Canada gives her a preference by a one-third reduction of the duties which we compel foreigners to pay. It is not honest on the part of The Times to belittle this large preference or to offset it by our importation of free goods from other lands. It is not to favor the United States that we admit raw cotton and other materials free of duty, but to benefit our own industries and our own own people. Nor does this free admission harm Britain in any way. We would like to see in The Times columns another contrast—not of our treatment of British and American products, respectively, but of the Canadian preference to British manufactures contrasted with the British embargo on Canadian cattle. The Times should get the "beam" out of its own eye before it makes such pretentious search for the Canadian "mole."

The contradictory statements of the Government organs respecting the packing industry agreement tend to deepen the mystery of which even The Pioneer complains. First the Patriot announced that an agreement had been entered into. It has since refused to print the text of the agreement. The Pioneer guesses that there is no agreement as yet. The latter journal also wants to know whether The Guardian is seeking to annul an agreement already made or to prevent the completion of an agreement. We will answer frankly. If an agreement has been made on the terms first stated in the Patriot it ought to be annulled. If it is yet incomplete it ought not to be completed. We leave the liberal organs to settle between themselves their contradictory statements.

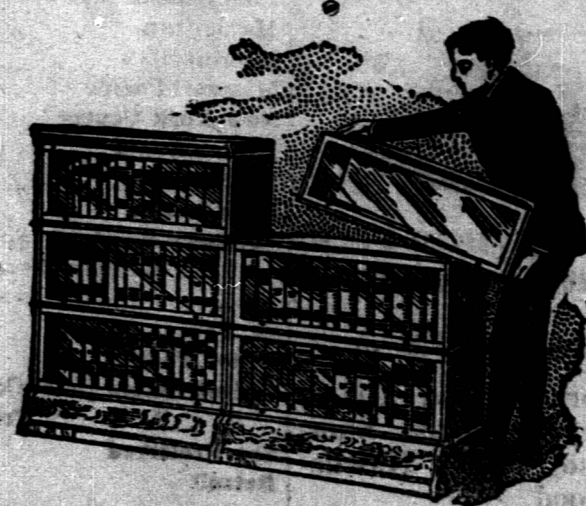
